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IS HEAVILY DENIED

THAT IS THE BEST THE SUPREME COURT GIVES REV. J. C. HULL... IT HAS NO JURISDICTION... FINAL JUDGMENT BEING ENTERED BY THE TRIAL COURT SIX MONTHS AGO.

EX-PREACHER'S PRISON LIFE... Unhappy as It May Be, Will Have to Do Him for a While, at Least.

C. D. O'Brien, representing Rev. James C. Hull, the West side preacher, appeared before the supreme court yesterday with a writ of error in accordance with the suggestion of the supreme court that such a measure might at one time have secured the remaining of the preacher criminal for sentence.

The issue between the St. Paul Sidewalk company and Comptroller McCarty, who is opposing the mandamus proceedings instituted by the city to counterclaim the city's contract with the sidewalk company, was on the calendar for trial yesterday.

The petition of the defendant for a writ of error in the Ramsey county case having been duly considered, and it appearing on the face of such petition that judgment was entered in said court in this case more than six months before the making of this application, and that there is now no jurisdiction to issue the writ, ordered that the petition be and it is hereby denied.

TRIED AND FOUND WANTING... A. B. Miller Wants M. E. Barringer to Take Back His Horse.

Andrew B. Miller wants Milton E. Barringer to take back the horse that Mr. Barringer let him have in exchange for a suit of clothes, valued at \$40, and restore to him his said promissory notes. To this end Mr. Miller has sued Mr. Barringer in the district court.

Mr. Miller further alleges that the horse so warranted by the defendant is really wind-broken and straggling and is between eighteen and twenty years of age, and is not worth over \$5. For these reasons Mr. Miller asks the court to order the defendant to take back the horse and restore the notes for \$40, and to restrain him from negotiating the notes or attempting to secure a chattel mortgage on the horse.

THEY ARE IN REVOLT

PEOPLE OF THE CLEVELAND DISTRICT WANT A HIGH SCHOOL THERE... PROTEST AGAINST CLOSING... WILL BE SUBMITTED AT THE NEXT MEETING OF THE BOARD.

MORALS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS... Van Buren Union Considers the Advantages of a Systematic Course in Such Instruction.

There is a steady and very emphatic feeling of indignation in the vicinity of the Cleveland high school over the proposed consolidation of the high schools of the city for the purpose of retrenchment.

There are now 161 pupils in the Cleveland high school. If the school is consolidated with the Central high school it will be consolidated in name only, for it is believed that not more than 10 or 15 per cent of the pupils will ever travel more miles to attend the Central building.

This was the sentiment of the St. Paul High School union for the Cleveland district, as expressed at last evening's meeting. The bad weather prevented the meeting from being largely attended, but those who were there expressed themselves very forcibly on the matter, and will not tolerate the idea of consolidation for a moment.

The Cleveland high school is not in any sense a public school, in the school, it has passed the standard required by law, and has been recognized by the state department of public instruction as a legal high school, and is now under the jurisdiction of the state, which pays the school an annual appropriation.

Prof. Schmidt, of the Lutheran college, spoke at some length upon the matter. He said that it would be far wiser to close all of the schools a month earlier than to close any one of them.
