DECIDE IT TONIGHT

SCHOOL BOARD WILL THEN PASS UPON THE LIST OF TEACHERS

FOR THE NEXT SCHOOL YEAR.

SUPT. CURTIS HAS BEEN AT WORK UPON IT FOR SEVERAL DAYS.

TUESDAY THE CHARTER LIMIT.

The list must be agreed upon at the Special Meeting to be held tonight.

The charter provides that the board of school inspectors shall, as far as possible, appoint not later than June 15 of each year all the teachers for the next ensuing school year and notify each teacher. To comply with this provision a special meeting of the school board has been called for this evening at 8 o'clock.

The list of teachers for the coming year is now being prepared by Supt. Curtis and will be submitted to the board at the meeting tonight for revision, if it is considered necessary, and approval.

The selection of teachers will settle beyond all doubt the question of the closing of the Humboldt, Cleveland and Mechanic Arts high schools. The consolidation of these three schools with the Central high school will not, however, reduce the total number of teachers employed by the board. As a matter of fact, it is claimed, the number of teachers will be increased, as the rooms in the three buildings now used for high schools will be utilized for grade schools. The Cleveland high school building will be needed to relieve the overcrowded condition of the Brissson school in the First ward. The Humboldt high school building in the Sixth ward will also take the higher grade scholars from the Lafayette school, and by this means give more room for scholars at that school.

Rooms in the Mechanic Arts high school will be utilized to make room for the lower grades in the Eighth ward. The Second ward will be obliged to get along without any additional school buildings. In the proposed change in the Sixth ward the board will save the rent of annex buildings which are now used owing to the overcrowded condition of the Lafayette school.

By the consolidation the board expects to give scholars in the lower grades proper facilities, and at the same time save the \$41,000 which was set apart for building purposes and use it in the general maintenance fund for the schools. With the \$38,500 which was available for the same purpose, the building fund the board will have \$409,000, which is \$46,000 less than was set apart for the schools last year.

None of the teachers will be anything but satisfied with the proposed change in the Sixth ward, and those who are not given positions there will also be offered places so that as far as leaving any of the present force out of positions there will be nothing of the kind. There will, however, be a reduction in salaries, and a number of those now receiving salaries over the \$1,000 mark will be offered positions at the same or lower salaries.

Charles Zschau and his alleged accomplice in the German-American bank robbery, George K. Jackson, spent a quiet day at the county jail yesterday, using their best efforts to keep cool and to appear as cheerful as their respective positions would allow.

Both prisoners received a number of visitors. Jackson's callers were his father, mother and sister, together with a number of business acquaintances, with whom he laughed and talked through the gratings of the jail corridor in the most unconcerned manner. The conversation for the most part was general, but when the bank robbery was touched upon Jackson frequently declared that he was utterly ignorant of the whole affair. Zschau had been brought down stairs, and now occupies a cell in the boys' corridor. He is looking quite well and appears cheerful.

The young man conversed pleasantly with former associates in the bank who called upon him, with Jackson's father and with Charles Eisenmenger, his cousin, but showed an evident disinclination to in any way discuss the robbery. He is quiet, composed and thoughtful, evidently having recovered from the severe nervous strain under which he at first labored, and is in a measure resigned to his position.

"How are you getting along?" asked a reporter for the Globe, as Zschau received his supper of bread and milk last evening.

"Very nicely," replied the young man. "Of course, it is not pleasant to be situated as I am, but on the whole I can't complain. I am treated well and shown every courtesy by those in charge of the jail. I spend most of my time smoking. They let me have a few friends here, and as my mother and sister were here to see me yesterday, I enjoyed their visit, but hardly expect them today, as it is very warm. No, I really do not care to talk about my case. The matter has been gone into so often and so much said that I would rather not talk about it. There is absolutely nothing new to be said in connection with the robbery, and I have nothing to say further statement. There is really nothing more to be said."

"Did you see the picture of the individual who supplied the subject and handling of the robbery?" asked a reporter.

"You see," he continued, "there is a picture of the man in the corner. My picture should have been there; but, on account of this trouble, there is nothing but a blank."

When the reporter called on Jackson in the bank robbery was still a matter of some interest, and was rumored a woman was implicated in the matter. Zschau only smiled and shook his head.

"Well," he heard that story of the woman," he said, and simply allowed his smile to broaden.

When the reporter called on Jackson the latter was conversing with Charles Eisenmenger, Zschau's cousin, and a nephew of Louis Eisenmenger, his bondsman.

"Yes," said Mr. Eisenmenger, "I have heard that, but that you will come out all right."

"I know I will," replied Jackson. "I am ignorant of the whole matter, and in a man is innocent he is bound to be vindicated."

"Well, the matter was in the hands of the county attorney when my uncle signed the warrant for your arrest," said Eisenmenger, "and he feels that you will be able to straighten that matter out, too."

"Is there a likelihood that Mr. Eisenmenger will withdraw the charge against you?" asked the reporter of Jackson.

"I don't know," replied the young man. "I have given him an opportunity to do so, but it looks as though the matter had gone too far, even if Mr. Eisenmenger desired to take such a course."

Asked later the significance of his conversation with Jackson, Mr. Eisenmenger said he knew nothing of his uncle's intentions. He said his uncle signed the warrant against Jackson because he felt that it was necessary for him to do so as a mere formal proceeding, and not because he knew anything of the supposed evidence against Jackson.

It was thought that he had been in the bank robbery, though how deeply he was implicated was not known.
