LOCAL NEWS NOTES.

The monthly meeting of the St. Paul Humane society will take place at their rooms, 628 Chamber of Commerce building, tomorrow at 11 a. m.

Articles of incorporation of the B. Heller Liquor Company, of Duluth, capital stock \$50,000, were filed yesterday. The incorporators are B. Heller, I. Heller and S. Heller.

The monthly session of the city hospital for June as compared yesterday was as follows: Admissions, 38; births, 4; deaths, 7; discharged, 97; patients still receiving treatment, 108.

Edward Brandenstein and a lady were thrown from a buggy and somewhat injured at Selby and Mackubin Wednesday night. The horse stumbled over a pile of rock from the new telephone conduit.

The water boat was taking in receipts for low service rentals yesterday. It is expected that between now and the date when the discount comes the total of the receipts from \$25,000 will be received.

Anton Mison, president, and George Park, secretary of the Union club, filed amended articles of incorporation yesterday. Its place of location shall be lot 5, section 36, town 20 north, range 22 west, otherwise the south shore of Lake Owassow.

Members of Acker Post 21, G. A. R., will meet at the post headquarters at 10 o'clock, in full uniform, to attend the funeral of I. D. Morgan, which occurs from 340 Hamilton street, at 2. The post burial service will be held at Oakland cemetery.

Frederick R. Welz, Robert Mangler, Andrew Heckler filed articles with the secretary of state yesterday incorporating as the Weiz-Mangler company. The capital stock of the company is \$40,000, and its purpose is to conduct a wholesale liquor business.

State Auditor Dunn held a sale of lands at Brainerd, Crow Wing county, on June 28. The amount sold was \$24,400, an average price of \$12.12 per acre.

For June the customs office collected \$12,216.55, and the internal revenue office \$18,762. For the fiscal year ending July 1, the customs office collected \$155,782, and the internal revenue office \$2,224,200. Of the latter total \$77,000 was collected the last day of June.

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SPITS ON IT AGAIN.

ASSEMBLY DEFEATS THE DAILY ORDINANCE FOR A CHARTER COMMISSION.

VOTE STOOD FOUR AND FOUR.

REASONS GIVEN BY THE QUARTETTE OPPOSING IT FOR THEIR ACTION.

THE RAYMOND AVENUE BRIDGE.

No Prospect of Its Construction at This Time—Some Cyclical Matters.

The Daily ordinance requesting the judges of the district court to appoint a charter commission was defeated in the assembly last evening by a tie vote, two favoring the passage of the measure and two opposing it.

After the assembly adjourned last evening a reporter for the Globe asked the four members of the board of public works, the charter commission as to their reasons for such action.

Assemblyman Reardon also thought the matter of the bridge was important, but that later he might vote for the measure.

Assemblyman Mabon said that he was not a member of the committee on streets, and that his attention was called to the fact that the passage of the ordinance and the appointment of a commission would be a vote for anything.

It is reported that the principal objection to the new ordinance is that it is fearful that the measure might knock them out of \$2,500,000, and that they are not in a position to take up the matter.

Mr. Thompson is in doubt as to the regularity of the action of the committee at the meeting. He had forgotten to bring the ordinance up until after the meeting had adjourned.

On the vote to adopt the ordinance the vote was a tie, the result of the roll call being given above. The vote by which the ordinance was lost was reconsidered, and the measure referred back to the committee.

Mr. Daly said he was surprised to know that some of his colleagues were opposed to allowing the people to frame their own charter.

Mr. Reardon jumped to his feet and said the measure did not allow the people to frame their own charter, but allowed fifteen men to do so for them.

Mr. Reardon moved that when the assembly adjourned it be Tuesday evening next. It was explained that this was in the interests of the persons who were interested in the West Side bank.

Mr. Markham said the parties interested in the bank were not to be disturbed by the ordinance, and that the settlement of claim against the bank by the city.

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THEY CITE THE LAW.

MINNESOTA SAVINGS BANK STOCK-HOLDERS RESIST THE SUITS OF THE CITY.

ANSWER FILED YESTERDAY.

INSISTS THAT THE CITY'S DEPOSIT WAS IN VIOLATION OF LAW.

BEING GREATER THAN THE SUM THEREIN PERMITTED TO BE DEPOSITED—IT WAS NOT AN AUTHORIZED DEPOSITORY EITHER.

Attorneys for the sureties on the bond given by the Minnesota Savings bank, who were sued by the city to recover the \$10,000 of the city funds on deposit in that institution, filed answers in the suits yesterday.

The answer sets up that under the section of the charter amounts deposited in banks by the city shall not exceed the assessed valuation of the capital stock as shown by the duplicate city assessment.

The answer also sets up that the bank was organized under the law of 1867, and was not authorized to issue any stock, and, in fact, did not issue any.

That by reason of such organization as a savings bank the institution was not subject to taxation. That at the time the money was deposited in the bank by the city there was no duplicate tax list in the assessor's office, and that there is no such list in the office of the county assessor.

It is admitted that Oct. 6, 1896, the trustees of the bank passed a resolution authorizing the president and cashier to procure and file bonds for such deposits, as provided by law.

It is argued that the deposit of the \$10,000 by the city treasurer was unlawful and unauthorized. Another defense is that the bank was not designated as a city depository.

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WHY THEY OPPOSED IT.
