Trains also leave St. Paul 11:15 p. m. and Minneapolis 11:50 p. m., arriving at Duluth next morning, giving passengers a half day viewing sights at the head of the lake before departure of steamship.



#### AN ITINERARY OF THE TOUR.








## Hotel Iroquois,
