REBUKE FOR LABOURERE.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—

The close of the session of parliament leaves neither of the political parties in an altogether enviable frame of mind. The latest antagonism of the different schools of Ministerials has threatened more than once during the past six months to bring about war in the Tory camp, and the recess leaves considerable numbers of Conservatives in a state of high indignation and resentment. The malcontents claim that the legislation has been reactionary and socialistic. Many of them are angry at what they declare to be a humiliating surrender of the national honor on the demand of America. The Marquis of Londonderry, representing the big class of Tory landlords, has added to the discontent by publishing yesterday a letter in which he practically cuts asunder from the Unionists, saying in so many words that he cannot stand the Irish land bills nor Mr. Chamberlain's pet measure, the workmen's compensation bill, which latter he dubs socialistic. The marquis adds that the Conservatives would never have consented to become law if it had been introduced by Mr. Chamberlain before he changed his politics.

LONDON MONEY MARKET.

Tendency to Harden on the Fall in New York Exchange.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The London market yesterday opened nearly 1 per cent on the fall in New York exchange. There was a very large forward business in American bills. With reference to the \$4,300,000 Japanese loan recently raised, this sum was transferred to the Japanese government in three nearly equal installments, the first in August, the second a month later and the third in the last week in September. This is not yet known here and it will help make difficult the general market. It is expected that any gold will go to Japan, but as to that nothing is known yet.

ONLY A GARZE.

Says the St. James Gazette of Wolcott's Commission.

LONDON, Aug. 7.—The Westminster Gazette this afternoon commenting on the letter sent by Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, the financial secretary, to the United States monetary commission now in London, postponing until October the reply of the British government to the invitation of the United States and France to meet in a conference upon the subject of bimetalism, says: "Everybody knows that the mission of the silver envoys is a system of general mismanagement, and the English government would not have lent themselves to its prolongation. Of course, the answer of both Indian and Chinese governments in October is a foregone conclusion."

PRINCE HENRY HAS THREE POSSIBLE DUELS ON HAND.

PARIS, Aug. 7.—Lieut. Boppa, the only surviving officer of the Fourteenth battalion of Gen. Dabarricid's brigade from the Italian expedition against Abyssinia, has challenged Prince Henry, of Orleans, in consequence of the latter's strictures upon the conduct of the Italian expedition in Africa. This is the third challenge received by the prince for the same cause. Gen. Albertone and Lieut. Pina have precedence over Lieut. Boppa in the matter.

PILEGRIMS RECEIVED.

Pope Leo Gives Audience to a Party of One Thousand.

ROME, Aug. 7.—The pope, who is in excellent health, this morning received 1,100 French pilgrims and bestowed his blessing upon them. Manager Murselle, the Canadian high commissioner in Canada, who recently returned here, read the reply to his holiness to the pope, the briefest of replies, which afforded the pilgrims the satisfaction at this time of tribulation to see around him French workmen in whom he placed a special interest. GOOD BANK STATEMENT.

Showing for the Week Favorable in Every Feature.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—The Financier says: The statement of the New York banks for the week ending Aug. 7 is favorable in every feature and indicative of the better business conditions which prevail, not only at this center, but over the country generally. The idle cash was reduced about \$4,000,000 and the surplus reserve, while still in excess of \$40,000,000, is lower than at any time since the third week in January. The loss in the current week was due partly to the withdrawals of legal tenders for export purposes not reflected in the previous statement, and partly to the fact that a few days since by New York city also occasioned some shifting of funds. It is important to note, however, that the banks are not gaining heavily from the interior movement, and the decline in domestic exchange rates, as noted in this analysis last week, still continues. With New York funds at a discount the probability of continued shipments becomes less.
