HE FORGOT RULE 53

EMPIRE HASKELL BEAT ST. PAUL OUT OF A RUN YESTERDAY AFTERNOON.

CLOSE GAME IS PROTESTED ON THE GROUND THAT EMPIRE HASKELL DID NOT FOLLOW THE RULES.

Which would have necessitated further play. The difficulty arose in this way. In the eighth inning, with one out, McBride on third and George on first, Glasscock hit what looked like a sure safe hit well to Slagle's left.

The thing was so sure, seemingly, that George ran away beyond second, and from Slagle's phenomenal catch, secured the ball. He was able to throw it back to first base, with Griffin's assistance, before George's return. Meanwhile, however, McBride had run in from third, crossing the plate before Ganzel held the ball at first base.

Umpire Haskell held that the run did not count, "as it was on a double play."

Just where he got his authority for the decision is not known, as it is in direct contradiction of Rule 53, which is as follows:

One run shall be scored every time a base runner, after having legally touched the first three bases, shall touch the home base before the pitcher has delivered the ball to a third man if forced out, or is put out before reaching first base, a run shall not be scored.

So the Bobolinks won yesterday on a scratch.

The dissatisfaction, which grew out of the umpire's plainly illegal ruling on the play, should not be permitted for a moment to detract from the glory of Slagle's catch, the play which made the complication possible in the first place.
