MARY'S STORY TOLD

“WOMAN IN THE CASE” ON THE STAND TO HELP LUET-GERT.

STRONG CARD FOR DEFENSE.

THEORY OF THE STATE FLATLY CONTRADICTED IN EVERY PARTICULAR.

STOOD CROSS-EXAMINATION WELL.

“Very Self-Possessed Young Woman” the Comment of the State's Attorney—Day's Detail.

CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—The strongest witness for the defense who has yet appeared in the Luetgert trial was on the stand today. The witness was Mary Siemmering, the domestic in the Luetgert household, for long when it is charged by the state that the prisoner murdered his wife. There was no mistaking the feeling of the girl toward Luetgert; she was there to do him all the good in her power, and she stood by him stoutly. She had made statements before the grand jury and to the state's attorney before the trial began, and when her assertions on the stand today differed from the statements he is said to have made at that time, she had not the slightest hesitation in repudiating anything that she might have said when not under oath. The cross-examination during the afternoon and up to the morning of yesterday was a most interesting one. She hung to the more important elements of her story, though contradicting herself upon points of little material value. States Attorney Deneen, whose mode of cross-examination is of the electrical order, remarked tonight that Mary Siemmering passed through the ordeal well. She is a remarkably self-possessed young woman for a person of her station in life, said the states attorney, “but we are not through with her yet.”

Mary Siemmering reiterated her story on cross-examination to the effect that Luetgert and his wife lived together happily. She denied positively that the stories of frequent domestic brawls were exaggerated. She also said that she and Mrs. Luetgert were on friendly terms, and Mrs. Luetgert often paid her extra wages because she pleased her with her work. The witness said that Mrs. Luetgert told her to say nothing to Luetgert about the extra pay.

Last January, the witness stated, she paid up her mind to leave the Luetgert household, but Mrs. Luetgert objected to her leaving and she reconsidered. She is a remarkably self-possessed young woman for a person of her station in life, said the states attorney, “but we are not through with her yet.”

The witness was somewhat bitter in her narrative of her alleged experience with the police. While under arrest, she said, she was insulted and threatened by policemen who informed her that they knew she and Luetgert had been guilty of wrong-doing and that to save herself she had better desert “the Dutchman” as they called Luetgert, and testify against him. The witness declared positively she never was in Luetgert's sausage factory along with Luetgert on the night in question, as had been testified to. She also denied that she was ever in the factory with Mrs. Luetgert and that Luetgert knew of letters from her to his wife and that the latter wept, as was testified to by a witness for the prosecution. In fact, her testimony was a complete denial of the evidence of the prosecution in any way implicating her in a compromising manner with Luetgert.

APRAID OF HAINES. State's Attorney Deneen, Assistant State's Attorney William M. McEwen and Inspector M. J. Conroy had a consultation this morning, during which the matter of calling Fred Haines, an ex-newspaper writer, to the witness stand was discussed. Haines is under conviction for forgery. Last August he was sentenced to the penitentiary by Judge Need. Afterward, through the influence of friends, the sentence was vacated and the case taken under advisement. Haines has acted as a sort of confidential secretary to a number of letters from him, it is said that Haines asserts that he wrote letters to A. W. C. Grotty, of New York, for Luetgert, in which Grotty was urged to come to Chicago and testify that he saw Mrs. Luetgert alone with Luetgert on the night in question. It is known that Haines told this story to the state's attorney Deneen some time ago.

The prosecution hesitates about calling Haines to the witness stand. States Attorney Deneen is not exactly satisfied with the statement of Haines. “I may call him as a rebuttal witness, if Grotty is produced by the defense,” said the state's attorney this morning. “but I do not believe the defense will call Grotty. In that event, we will not need Haines.”

Unexpectedly, no reference was made by the court to the matter yesterday taken under advisement. This was whether the defense will be allowed to produce witnesses to show that Mrs. Luetgert threatened to leave her home six months prior to the date of her disappearance. A rule on this point is expected on Monday.

The first witness called this morning was Mary Siemmering, Luetgert's servant girl, for love of whom it is alleged he killed his wife. There was a general craning of necks, and many of the people in the court room rose to get a better glimpse of the young woman as she ascended to the witness stand. The face of Mary Siemmering was flushed, as she held up her right hand to be sworn to, and she looked at the court clerk. She was evidently under suppressed excitement. The young woman was neatly attired in a brown costume, and wore a small chap hat of the same color.

Attorney Phalen conducted the direct examination. Under his guidance the witness related what she said was the whole truth about her experience with the Luetgert family. She said she had lived with the Luetgerts seven or eight years as a domestic. During all that time, the witness testified, Luetgert had treated his wife kindly, and there was none of the quarreling or bickering the prosecution charged. Coming down to May 1, the date of Mrs. Luetgert's disappearance, the witness said that on the afternoon of that day Mrs. Luetgert said to her: “Mary, I am going to leave. My husband's money is all gone, and I am going too.”

MARY ON THE STAND. At 7 o'clock Saturday evening, May 1, the witness said, Mrs. Luetgert took from a closet a cloak, and looking at it, remarked to the witness that she had noticed that moths had eaten the cloth. The witness said she went to her room and to bed shortly after 8 o'clock that night.

The following morning Mrs. Luetgert was missing and the little bank of one of the children was broken open and the small sum of money it had contained was gone. The witness testified that Mrs. Luetgert had acted queerly for some time prior to May 1, and had often whipped her children. With some show of feeling the witness said she was arrested on May 15 and taken to the East Chicago avenue station where she was kept two days. She said the heavy rain that fell on the night of her arrest when Mrs. Luetgert was, and at the station the matron took all her clothing from her. While at the station Inspector Schack and Assistant State's Attorney McEwen questioned her sharply, accusing her of improper relations with Luetgert, which she denied.

Inspector Schack said to me, “The old man, meaning Luetgert, will never see the light of day again, and if you don't tell the truth, I'll punish you. We'll put you and Luetgert together,” said the witness, “and he held up his hands and showed me how it would be done.”

The Gold Standard Alone, the Non-Insane Says, Not Just What the People Need.

RED OAKS, Ia., Sept. 25.—The Iowa Republican campaign was opened here today with Leslie M. Shaw, candidate for governor, as the principal speaker. Pleasant weather and a good crowd greeted the candidate. Short addresses were made by Congressman Haker, Congressman Doolittle and H. M. Millman, candidate for lieutenant governor. Mr. Shaw said in part: “I suppose I should disappoint my Democratic friends if I should not refer to present conditions and advise you so. Last year the readers of free silver papers were urged to buy Mexican silver dollars for their face in gold. But the Mexican dollar that was worth 30 cents a year ago is worth today 45 cents. Happy Chicago Democrats who followed the advice of the silver Republican and the Populist, who urged their auditors just so soon as a tariff schedule for protection should be enacted, to buy everything in the line of farm products and to produce without fear of a glutted market.”

Your representative to congress from the Sixth district was telling me the other day that he had better do to to the bank immediately after the Dingley bill was signed. A Democratic client had asked him what he had better do to to the bank. He had in the bank. Maj. Lacey told him to buy anything that the farmer had to sell. Says the client: “I don't believe I would have lost my interest for a year and 20 per cent of principal. If he had followed the advice of his Republican friends he would have made 25 per cent.”

They could not have supposed that the voter they were trying to influence had no means to learn the truth. They only can find it that the platform declared the wish of the convention.

HEAVY LOSS IN CASH.

New York Surplus Drawn Upon to Move the Crops.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—The New York Financier says this week: The statement of the New York banks showed, as had been anticipated, a heavy loss in cash and a shrinkage of the reserve. The banks reported a loss of \$10,000,000 since Nov. 1 last. With gold imports beginning, the impression prevails that the banks will be able to meet their obligations. The advance in the money market has evidently brought about some liquidation. It is not noticeable, however, that the operations of the bank, the National City account for the total changes in loans. So also its deposit changes make up at least one-third of the entire decrease reported by all the banks. The cash withdrawn all went to the interior. The statement does not balance, but the plain interpretation is that the demand for money for crop purposes is at its full height and must be met to continue for some time to come. It will not be surprising if the loan item exhibits further decreases, in view of the urgent demand for money to move the crops. The increase in loans, for the present week, is the first that has occurred since the opening week in May, since which time the loan item has reached a total of \$4,000,000. Seven of the New York banks are below the 25 per cent reserve requirement and a large number of the institutions are only slightly above it. The future of the market rests largely, of course, on the extent of gold imports. The treasury deficit will help the banks to some extent, but against this is the coming United States bond closure sale, which will take a large sum from the open market. It is estimated that the foreign trade balance in our favor for the three months ending Sept. 30 will be about \$100,000,000, and this with cotton exports only beginning. The resources which the country can command, in case of a heavy drain on the market, are enormous. Even with the continued use of funds to meet the immense expansion of trade at interior points, the outlook remains very hopeful for legitimate business enterprises.

TREATY RELATIONS ASSUMED. Chile and Japan Parties to an Interesting Ceremony.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—An interesting ceremony occurred at the Chilean legation at 3 o'clock this afternoon when, for the first time, diplomats from Chile and Japan met. Chile and Japan. Minister Gana, of Chile, has been delegated as the plenipotentiary in behalf of his country, and Minister Washi of Japan, for that country. The officials of the two legations were present, and after the instrument had been executed, there was an exchange of congratulations. The treaty was signed in six duplicates, two in English, two in Spanish and two in Japanese. It is an extensive document, providing for peace, amity and commerce, and covering the full range of relations between the countries, as it is the first and only treaty between them. It differs from the new treaty of the United States with Mexico, and with other foreign nations, as the latter took up old treaties, while this inaugurates new relations between the two countries.

ANY OVERT ACT WILL MEET WITH A VERY PROMPT RESPONSE.

THE BALTIMORE TO SAIL AT ONCE.

Men to Be Transferred From New York to Mare Island to Complete Her Crew.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—As an aid to expedition in placing the cruiser Baltimore in active service, upon the arrival of the Philadelphia from Hawaii Acting Secretary Roosevelt has directed that 180 men be transferred from New York to Mare Island. The Philadelphia has on board several short term men, and the men ordered to the Pacific slope will take their places on the Baltimore, which will be placed in commission with a short crew on Oct. 1. Although the orders to the Philadelphia to return home contain a proviso that she shall not leave Honolulu until Rear Admiral Miller is certain the Japanese cruiser Nanai has started for Japan, the navy department officials believe the Nanai has already left Hawaii. The Wheeling, it is believed, will reach Hawaii in eight or nine days, so that the Philadelphia will be in California waters in fifteen days or about Oct. 8, provided the Nanai has gone. Twenty-four hours will probably be allowed for the transfer of officers and men to the Baltimore, and six days later, or about Oct. 15, a modern American cruiser in splendid condition, will leave Honolulu, where she can remain for three years if necessary.
