



JUST LAUGHED AT IT

COL. SCHEFFER TAKES NO NOTICE OF A RESTRAINING ORDER OF COURT.

FIGHT OVER VOLKSZEITUNG

DEVELOPS SOMETHING EVERY DAY, BUT THE PAPER STILL APPEARS.

COL. TEITZ'S LATEST MOVE IN IT.

Will Now Ask for an Order for the Allemania President to Show Cause.

Receiver Edward Tietz, of the Volkszeitung Printing and Publishing company, secured a temporary injunction yesterday restraining Albert Scheffer and the bondholders whom he represents from continuing to get the paper out.

But it came out yesterday afternoon nevertheless, and Albert Scheffer and his ready-made editors performed the feat. In consequence of Col. Scheffer's disobedience of the injunction order, which was served upon him twice yesterday, Receiver Tietz will apply bright and early tomorrow morning for an order to show cause why Col. Scheffer et al. should not be punished for contempt of court.

The petition upon which the temporary injunction was issued alleged, first, that the chattel mortgage by virtue of the foreclosure of which Col. Scheffer, as trustee for the bondholders, had taken possession of the plant, is invalid, for the reason that it was made to secure an indebtedness of \$30,000, whereas the articles of incorporation of the Volkszeitung prohibit the concern from incurring an indebtedness in excess of \$10,000.

It is further alleged that \$5,000 of the debt purported to be secured by the chattel mortgage represents the personal and private indebtedness of Charles Lienau, the president of the Volkszeitung. Finally, the petition alleges that Albert Scheffer and the other defendants are in possession of and are using property not covered by the mortgage, including type-setting machines, a safe and other movables acquired by the company since the giving of the mortgage three years ago.

When Otto Kueffner, acting as attorney for Receiver Tietz, accompanied by a deputy sheriff, visited the office of the Volkszeitung yesterday afternoon, and served the injunction on Col. Scheffer, the president of the Allemania bank smilingly declined to take any notice of the restraining character of the order, but went on "getting out" the paper.

The order specifically restrains Col. Scheffer and his force from doing anything which would tend to prevent or interfere in any way with the receiver entering upon the premises and taking possession, and from interfering with Mr. Tietz acting as such receiver. Mr. Kueffner, when seen late yesterday afternoon, said that Col. Scheffer

ignored the order of the court, and that on Monday morning he, Mr. Kueffner, would apply for an order to show cause why the defendants should not be punished for contempt of court.

In the meantime Receiver Tietz is receiving—thus far—the mail alone.
