Picking up the paper yesterday morning, Mrs. Williams was shocked to see the account of the shooting of her brother, Frank Egbert, and the wounding of her brother-in-law, Ben Marshall. The account was the first intimation the sisters had of the affair, and the shock was so sudden that both ladies were prostrated.

When seen last evening, Mrs. Williams said she could hardly believe the story. Her brother, Frank Egbert, she said, was chief of the fire department at Frankfort, and was not, as the telegram stated, a desperate character. The only explanation she could give of the affair was that it grew out of an election row. Marshall, she said, was a well-known business man of Frankfort, and was married to the sister, Marshall was a Catholic and her brother was not, although she was not certain and knew nothing except what the paper stated, she imagined that the A. P. A. business and political differences had caused the trouble. For the past two years, Mrs. Williams said, there had been more or less friction among the Republicans and Democrats at Frankfort, owing to the change made in many of the offices after Gov. Bradley's election. Marshall was a Democrat, and her brother held his position in the fire department by reason of Republican influence. Her brother left a wife and three children, and Marshall has a wife and seven children. Both Marshall and her brother were about thirty-seven years of age.
