## FACTS SIFTED OUT

### CENTRAL HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES AND THE STATE UNIVERSITY.

REGISTRAR JOHNSON'S SAY.

EXPLANATION OF THE INCIDENTS THAT HAVE STIRRED ST. PAUL EDUCATORS.

PROF. SMITH MAKES CORRECTION.

Misunderstanding About Higher Algebra and Solid Geometry—Issuance of Diplomas.

Supt. of Schools Curtis called on Registrar Johnson, of the state university yesterday afternoon, for an explanation. O. J. Smith, principal of the Central high school, had furnished Supt. Curtis with a formal statement as to the cause of the seemingly large proportion of the graduates of that school who entered the university this fall but were conditioned in higher algebra and solid geometry. The explanation in brief is this:  
"Nearly every university in the country has a different list of requirements for scholars entering it, and in the high schools it is necessary for the students to elect which university they desire to attend and then prepare for it by taking up those studies. The University of Minnesota now requires that its students come with preparation in higher algebra and solid geometry, and last year those of the high school scholars who had decided to attend the 'U' took up those studies; others of them did not take this preparatory course, but were simply graduated in the common course. Afterwards some of them decided to spend at least a year in the university.  
Last June, Registrar Johnson had notified Prof. Smith that hereafter no student would be admitted to the university unless he had a certificate that he had taken all the required studies, and also enclosed a package of these certificates. None of them were sent to the Humboldt or Cleveland high schools. Instead of following this plan, Mr. Johnson, this fall, admitted all high school scholars who had diplomas, and there is where the trouble began. In some cases the scholars did not have even these diplomas, and they were told to get a note from Supt. Smith as to whether they had been graduated. In cases where Mr. Smith was asked if the students had taken higher algebra and solid geometry, he answered that they had not, meaning the higher algebra as was taught in the university preparatory course. Then without asking these students to pass an examination, the registrar immediately conditioned them in these studies. These statements were admitted by Registrar Johnson, and it is probable that the algebra condition will be removed.  
Prof. Smith said to a Globe reporter yesterday that he wanted it distinctly understood that the St. Paul high schools are the equal of any in the state; their graduates go to universities all over the country, and in fact one of them went to Harvard this year, and a following letter was received from the faculty there, commending these high schools. There is one thing that should be changed, said Prof. Smith, and that is the issuing of diplomas, which literary men respect. Instead of them there should be issued certificates which show on their face just what the student has done and what studies he has completed. That would then be a documentary proof of his ability to enter any college that the requirements had been complied with—it would mean something.  
In connection with this subject Prof. Smith sent the following letter to the Globe last night:  
To the Editor of the Globe:  
I desire in the most public manner possible to correct an error in the studies in a Dispatch upon the subject of conditioned pupils from this city in the University of Minnesota, which literary men respect. It was not taught in the Cleveland and Humboldt high schools; nor did I say that the principals said so. I did say that the principals stated that they had not taught Olney's advanced (university) algebra. I also stated that the board of public works understood "advanced algebra" to mean Olney's, and had acted accordingly. Mr. Brynson stated that his pupils had taken solid geometry. I am unwilling to be a party to any seeming or possible injustice towards my fellow citizens, whose earnestness and enthusiasm I commend, and who have my good will and good wishes. I have no doubt that the Dispatch will correct its otherwise good report in this particular. Very respectfully,

### STREET CLEANING FIGURES.

Mayor Moran Signs the Resolution Calling for Them.

The mayor yesterday signed the resolution of assemblyman Dix, which was passed by the council, providing for the cleaning of the streets of St. Paul. It is declared by the resolution that, considering the amount of money which has always been expended upon the streets of St. Paul, very unsatisfactory and inadequate service is now being secured. The board of public works is instructed to send to the council a report showing the miles of street cleaned and swept and the amount of refuse and dirt which has been taken therefrom. The cost of the work is to be shown.  
For the future the council desires that the board of public works submit to the council by Jan. 1 the estimated cost of sweeping all cedar block pavements at least three times a week and daily where considered necessary. An estimate is also desired upon the probable cost of flushing all asphalt paved streets at least four times a week and daily where considered necessary. This to be considered in connection with hand sweeping of the streets now in vogue. The board is also called upon to report on whether the street railway company keeps its tracks clean, and what amounts, if any, the company have paid into the city treasury for sweeping.

## IS STILL A MYSTERY

### IDENTITY OF THE BODY OF THE WOMAN FOUND NEAR WHITE BEAR.

### DETAILS OF THE DRESS WORN.

### SURMISE AS TO THE POSSIBILITY OF ITS BEING A PARTICULAR PERSON.

### URNS OUT TO BE ERRONEOUS.

### Length of Skirt Shows It to Have Been Bicycle Show or That of a Girl.

The identity of the woman whose dead body was found near Lambert's lake, Monday afternoon, is still a mystery. That she was not the woman whom a morning paper conjectured she might possibly have been, was established last evening by the statement of a close female companion, who says positively that she has received a letter from her friend within the last week from Chicago. That the dead woman, however, was murdered seems to be no longer a question of doubt. The developments in the case yesterday were few as the tardiness of the authorities in beginning an investigation permits as yet of little more than mere speculation. The evidence already brought to light nevertheless strongly substantiates the murder theory. This is the belief of coroner Nelson, Chief Schwelzer, Sheriff Wagner and Assistant County Attorney Zollman, who will today set about solving the mystery upon the murder hypothesis.

The authorities will go to work practically in the dark. There are no reports of a missing woman which might furnish a possible clue to the identity of the skeleton. That there was a party of campers during the summer of 1896, near the place where the body was found, consisting of both men and women, has been established, however, and the first efforts of the authorities will be directed towards ascertaining if all these people can be accounted for. If all the members of the party are found alive, the mystery only deepens. Should it be found that one of the females has disappeared then will the police follow up the discovery. Today the residents of the vicinity of Lambert's lake will be questioned, and as the campers are said to have purchased supplies from the farmers and gardeners thereabouts, some definite information may be obtained concerning the party.
