The only discussion in which any of the commissioners took a decided stand came with the consideration of section one. As presented it provided that the city "may acquire by purchase, condemnation or otherwise, either within or without the limits of said city, any real or personal property, or any right, estate, interest or assessment therein, or any other property whatever, which may be required for any of the purposes of the city or any board or department thereof; but this chapter shall not be construed as in any way limiting or interfering with the powers of the park board to acquire property for its purposes, as provided in this charter."

The provision making an exception of the park board caused considerable strife. Commissioner Atwater thought there should be uniform methods of condemnation, and that the power to condemn should be in the hands of the city council. He did not know why if the exception was made of the park board, the same should not be done with the other boards of the city. Commissioner Gjersten agreed with Commissioner Atwater, and made no reference to the park board as stricken out of the section. Commissioners Hawley and Jones objected strongly. The former believed that if the park board was stricken out of the park board its usefulness would have ceased.

"That's right," answered Commissioner Atwater, "and I am sure that if a city department established in its place, which department should have the care of the park board, the same should not be done with the other boards of the city. MANY MONEY BILLS

SUBJECT OF FINANCIAL LEGISLATION TAKEN UP BY THE HOUSE COMMITTEE.

MR. HILL IS IN A HURRY. ANXIOUS TO REPORT A MEASURE EMBODYING THE PRESIDENT'S VIEWS.

WORK DIVIDED BY MR. WALKER. Three Subcommittees Named to Consider Acts That Have Been Submitted for Consideration.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The house committee on banking and currency, which will have the shaping of a considerable portion of the financial legislation before the house, held its first meeting this morning and outlined its general plan of action. In view of Secretary Gage's recommendation of a comprehensive revision of currency and banking affairs, a resolution was adopted inviting the secretary to embody his views in a bill. The committee was informed that the secretary was now at work on a measure, and that it would be available for the committee in about a week.

Mr. Hill of Connecticut, then precipitated a sharp debate by moving that the committee act at once by reporting to the house a bill embodying three of the financial features which had the president's approval. These were embodied in a bill heretofore offered by Mr. Brewster, of Pennsylvania, and Mr. Hill now proposed that the first three sections be placed before the house immediately. The three sections provided: Bank circulation up to the par value of bonds deposited; reduction of the tax on circulation to 1/2 per cent; and the establishment of small banks in rural communities. Mr. Hill said the committee would do well not to go through the tedious processes of considering and dividing on these three propositions, which appeared to meet with general acceptance and had received legislative approval.

Mr. Johnson, of Indiana, earnestly opposed such hasty action. He said there was no time to hear from the gentlemen forming the monetary commission and to weigh all the proposals. Precipitate action on such a vital subject would, he said, seriously prejudice it before the house and the country. Mr. Mitchell, of New York, also opposed such speedy action. The debate lasted until 12 o'clock, when the committee adjourned. The bill was not reported.

Chairman Walker announced four substitute committees and assigned to each a number of the banking and currency bills already introduced. The sub-committees will begin work at once on the bills introduced by their members. Mr. Walker substituted the bill of Mr. Johnson (No.
