COL. PLUMMER INSANE.

Sad Report From New York of the Condition of the North Dakota Orator.

BISMARCK, N. D., Feb. 12.—Private advices from New York city convey the information that Col. W. C. Plummer, the best known character in the state of North Dakota, and well known all through the Northwest, is confined in an asylum, and has been pronounced by the doctors to be insane. The reports that have been received would indicate that his chances of recovery are slight, and the news learned with regret in all parts of the state, where Plummer is well known as a campaign speaker, platform orator and raconteur. It is doubtful if there is any one in the United States more polished, fluent, eloquent and gifted public speaker than Plummer. For the past twenty years his voice has been heard on the stump in the three states of North Dakota, Minnesota and Montana, and in that time he has become well known as one of the most successful campaign speakers in the Northwest.

Plummer was born in Maine, and his boyhood was passed in that state. In 1876 he came to Minnesota, and engaged after a few months with Editor Hall, of the Fargo Republican. That position he held until the paper changed hands, and then drifted from place to place, being employed as a newspaper work and lecturing. He took an active part in the Blaine campaign of 1884, and was to have been governor of the state if Blaine had been elected. But Blaine was defeated, and Plummer, footsore again, drifted into country editorial work. In 1888 he completed his tour of duty after his election was appointed as receiver of the Minot land office, which position he held for several years, and then resigned, and returned to the office insufficient to suit his tastes. In the Montana capital fight he was engaged to speak for Anaconda, and had that city beset with a mob of men to have had a newspaper at Great Falls, through the efforts of Marcus Daly. But things went wrong for Plummer again, and he was again shattered. He went to New York several months ago and was engaged upon the Advertiser, and was in New York when his mental affliction befell him.
