SCHOOLS NOT TO CLOSE

MINNEAPOLIS PUBLIC MEN SHOW THEIR GENEROSITY. Mass Meeting at the Lyceum Makes It Plain That the Effort to Secure the Needed Funds by Subscription Will Be Responded to by a Generous Public.

The mass meeting of citizens held at the Lyceum theater, Minneapolis, yesterday afternoon for the consideration of the public school question now before the people of Minneapolis, was a rousing meeting, and if words and signs are to be relied upon, settled the question of closing the schools before the usual time. The floor and balcony of the theater were packed with interested people, mostly men, who were dressed were listened to attentively. Upon the platform were 150 prominent men and women, among whom were represented every prominent educational interest of the city. It was an assembly with a purpose.

After numerous addresses, in which the closing of the schools was generally looked at as a public calamity, a series of resolutions were adopted, declaring it to be for the best interests of the city to keep open the schools until the usual closing time, and directing the chairman to appoint a committee of fifteen prominent gentlemen to receive popular subscriptions to a common fund. The committee as afterwards appointed includes the following men: Rev. James D. Clark, D. P. Jones, John Swift, George Cook, S. M. Owen, George H. Partridge, E. P. Phelps, Lucien Swift, R. F. Nelson, C. P. Johnson, J. W. McMillan, T. S. Marek, Luth Jager, Gen. W. J. Hahn, S. E. Olson.

By virtue of the resolution, Capt. Charles W. Brown was made chairman of the committee. This committee is to appoint subcommittees, and will meet at 8 o'clock at the Commercial club for the purpose of perfecting plans. The amount of money needed to run the schools until the usual closing time, as estimated by the board of education, of which amount the teachers of the city had volunteered to contribute one-third the cost, is \$90,000 to be raised, and it is confidently believed that the money will be forthcoming almost as soon as the demand is made.
