



FOREIGN FINANCIAL. NEW YORK, March 11.—Evening Post's London financial cablegram: The stock mar-kets here opened better today, then became flat on further liquidations, but recovered later and closed steady to firm. One small failure was announced. Spanish securities were heavily sold on talk of a default in coupons or a reduction of interest. The lat-ter is possible, but nothing definite is known. Americans were the weakest market, closing flat. This was partly due to further liqui-dations by weak men, helped by rumors after business hours that the United States was about to declare the independence of Cuba. The Paris bourse was better after a period of dulness.

NO DANGER OF A PANIC

OUTPUT AND DISTRIBUTION NOT AFFECTED BY THE WAR SCARE

The Country Rests Assured That Its Industries and Its Resources Are Beyond the Reach of Any Foreign Power-Features of the Trade Week Are Favorable.

NEW YORK, March 11.—Dun & Co.'s review will say: It is most gratifying that no industry or branch of business shows any restriction or hindrance, but some have been rapidly gaining for the past week and month. The rail-ways are gaining even while speculat-ors are selling their stocks, and the demand for products for all the great industries is increasing. More gold is coming from Europe than is needed, \$10,868,000 having been ordered during the past week, and money markets are nowhere alarmed or stringent, though reasonably more cautious. The coun-try rests assured that its industries, al-most all of its business, the foreign

try rests assured that its industries, al-most all of its business, the foreign demand for its products especially, and all its resources are beyond the reach of any foreign power, and that its hon-or and foreign interests are in safe hands. Pig iron production in four months has grained a little but consumption

hands. Pig iron production in four months has gained a little, but consumption still more, and if preparations for war last only a few weeks they will add much to the demand. Other consump-tion for railroad cars, for vessels on the lakes, for elevators and oil pipe lines, for agricultural implement works and for sheets is beyond precedent, and structural and rail works are generally stronger in demand. Sales of wool for this week have been the smallest since the week of great-est alarm in August, 1896, but not be-cause any mills have stopped work. Little wool can be moved, with a new clip near and heavy stocks still in mills, without further reduction. Goods are now lower, in qualities less well known, though unchanged on standard grades. Cotton goods have a large distribution, and prices are generally steady. Prints are in better demand. Failures for the week have been 248 iyear, and 36 in Canada, against 61 last year.
