RICH DISCOVERY OF GOLD

FORMER RESIDENT OF STILLWATER STRIKES IT RICH

First End of the Whitehorn District of Colorado Struck by the Find—Thirty-Foot Vein That Promises Big Returns, According to the Report Made by the Assayer—Northwest News.

WHITEHORNS, Col., March 29.—George D. Keyes and A. C. Dore have made a rich gold discovery which has set the east end of the Whitehorn district wild. Keyes was, until recently, a resident of Stillwater, Minn. Their discovery is a vein some twenty-five or thirty feet in width that extends through the Gold City and Badger sections. It is a conglomerate and an ordinary in appearance, that no one thought of hanging it tested.

The Badger Creek Consolidated Gold Mining company had been working for some time to sink through this conglomeration, taking it to be a waste, hoping to locate a vein underneath. In the meantime Dore, a prospector and miner of long experience, and Keyes had staked two claims on this material and had thoroughly prospected it.

They decided that it was an immense vein lying between two dyke-like walls, that its composition was decomposed porphyry, quartz, oxidized quartz and yellow talc and that the south wall was schist and hornblende and the north wall granite. Their prospecting their discovery assays (tests were made and returns came in ranging from \$28.80 (the lowest assay at grass roots) into the hundreds.

The best thought of the country indorses your Cuban message and recent intention to avert war by all honorable means. Your action will be approved by a grateful nation.

There was no feeling that war should be avoided if it becomes necessary in the maintenance of the honor and dignity of the country, but they wished to express the sentiment that the president is pursuing that careful and prudent course demanded by the interests of humanity.
