REVENUE TO WAGE WAR

POPULAR LOAN OF FIVE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS

Tax on Beer, by the Measure, Raised From One to Two Dollars a Barrel With No Rebate for Stamps Unused or Destroyed—Chewing Gum and Cosmetics Are Also on the List.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Chairman Dingley, of the ways and means committee, this afternoon introduced into the house the war revenue measure, which the Republican members of the ways and means committee have prepared. It is the intention of Chairman Dingley to press the bill on Monday, and he hopes to have it through the house before adjournment on Tuesday.

It is probable that this programme will meet with opposition from the Democrats, who have not been consulted in its preparation and who will not have an opportunity to see it until it is presented to the full committee on Monday morning at 10 o'clock. They are inclined to think that they have been most unfairly treated. As it is directly a war measure, in which they are expected to acquiesce without opposition, they believe they should have been consulted in its preparation.

The Democrats have already decided to offer an income tax amendment. Chairman Dingley estimates that the measure, as framed, will raise between \$90,000,000 and \$100,000,000. The bill covers, in addition to the tax on beer, railroad tickets and petroleum, all of which were considered at different times as subjects for taxation, are not touched in the bill.

The revenue to be derived is distributed as follows: Fermented liquors, \$35,000,000; tobacco, \$15,000,000; cigars, \$5,000,000; tobacco licenses, \$5,000,000; stamp tax on documents, telegrams, etc., \$30,000,000; tonnage tax, \$2,500,000.

The amount to be raised by the stamp tax on wines, mineral waters, chewing gum, etc., has not been ascertained. The present tax on beer and fermented liquors is increased from \$1 to \$2 a barrel, but no rebate for unused beer and destroyed stamps is allowed. The tax on tobacco and snuff is increased to 12c a pound; upon cigars to \$4 per 1,000, weighing more than three pounds; and \$2 on cigars weighing less than three pounds per 1,000.

McKinley's Call for Volunteers. WASHINGTON, April 23.—The president today issued the following proclamation, calling for 125,000 troops to serve two years:

Whereas, by a joint resolution of congress, approved on April 20, 1898, entitled "Joint resolution, for the recognition of the people of Cuba; demanding that the government of Spain relinquish its authority and government in the island of Cuba, to withdraw its land and naval forces from Cuba and Cuban waters, and directing the president of the United States to use the land and naval forces of the United States to carry these resolutions into effect," and

Whereas, by an act of congress, entitled "An act to provide for the increasing of the military establishment of the United States, in time of war, and for other purposes," approved April 22, 1898, the president was authorized, in order to raise a volunteer army, to issue his proclamation calling for volunteers, to serve in the army of the United States.

Now, therefore, I, William McKinley, president of the United States, by virtue of power vested in me by the constitution and laws, and deeming sufficient occasion to exist, have thought fit to call for, and hereby do call for volunteers to the aggregate number of 125,000, in order to carry into effect the purpose of the said resolution, the same to be apportioned as far as practicable among the several states and territories and the District of Columbia, according to population, and to serve for two years, unless sooner discharged. The details for this object will be immediately communicated to the proper authorities through the war department.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. Done at Washington, this twenty-third day of April, 1898, and of the independence of the United States, the one hundred and twenty-second.

The bill also imposes a system of tonnage taxes of 8 cents per ton, not to exceed 50 cents per ton, for foreign ports, and from the receipt thereof for foreign ports, and from the receipt thereof for the marine hospital service.

Loan Provision. The loan provisions of the bill are as follows: That the secretary of the treasury is hereby authorized to borrow on the credit of the United States the sum of \$500,000,000, and to prepare and issue, in whole or in part, coupon or registered bonds, or other securities, in such form as he may prescribe, and in denominations of \$50 or some multiple of that sum, redeemable after ten years from the date of their issue and payable twenty years from such date, and bearing interest payable quarterly in coin, at the rate of 5 per cent per annum; and the bonds hereby authorized shall be exempt from all taxes or duties of the United States, as well as from taxation in any form by or under state, municipal or local authority; provided that the bonds authorized by this section shall be first offered as a popular loan under such regulations as to be prescribed by the secretary of the treasury as will give opportunity to the citizens of the United States to participate in the subscriptions to such loan; and a sum not exceeding one-half of 1 per cent of the amount of the bonds hereby authorized is hereby appropriated to pay the expense of preparing, advertising, issuing and selling the same.

That the secretary of the treasury is authorized to borrow from time to time, at the market rate of interest, not exceeding 3 per cent per annum, such sum or sums as, in his judgment, may be necessary to meet public exigencies, to issue certificates of indebtedness in such form as he may prescribe and in denominations of \$50 or some multiple of that sum, and each certificate so issued shall be payable with the interest accrued thereon, at such time, not exceeding one year from the date of its issue, as the secretary of the treasury may prescribe; provided, that the amount of such certificates outstanding shall at no time exceed \$100,000,000; and the proceeds of the sale of such certificates, when so issued, shall be applied to the redemption of the bonds and certificates of indebtedness authorized by this act.

Spain Polite. MADRID, April 23.—It is announced here that Spanish warships yesterday refrained from the easy capture of two American merchant vessels because war was not declared, and they desired to respect international law.

Press Hostile. BERLIN, April 23.—With singular unanimity the German press of every stripe is condemning the British ultimatum to the United States. The papers of Germany impute selfish and base motives to America and praise the attitude of Berlin in connection with the "undignified course of America."

THOUSANDS OF REGULARS THE NUMBER OF TROOPS AT CHICKAMAUGA DOUBLED

Cavalry Force Organized Into Brigades by Order of Gen. Brooke. On Monday Army Life at the Camp Will Begin in Earnest—Hard Work to Care for All the Animals.

By Associated Press. CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., April 23.—The organization into brigades of all the cavalry regiments of the United States army centered at Chickamauga National park is now complete. The following general order was issued today by Maj. Gen. Brooke:

General field orders No. 1.—The cavalry of this command is organized as follows: Cavalry, commanding: A. K. Arnold, First cavalry, commanding: First cavalry, Second cavalry, Third cavalry, Fourth cavalry, Fifth cavalry, Sixth cavalry, Seventh cavalry, Eighth cavalry, Ninth cavalry.

Fully 3,000 regular troops are now encamped at Chickamauga; the number of volunteers has doubled. The soldiers arrived so fast that it was difficult to handle them promptly, hardly an hour of the day passing without two or more long railroads coming in. The work of unloading the trains at the park was rendered doubly difficult by rain, which fell at intervals all day. On this account all drills were suspended until Monday.

After that time, however, army life will begin in earnest. It is expected by that time that nearly all the regular troops to be located at Chickamauga will have arrived, and the infantry as well as the cavalry and artillery divided into brigades. Of the infantry troops to be located at Chickamauga are three regiments each. Uncertainty as to the exact number of regiments to arrive will prevent any action in regard to the number of regiments until the troops are actually on the ground.

It is expected that Maj. Gen. Brooke will assign the senior colonels to lead the regiments, and the junior and brigade drills will be had. The Seventh infantry from Fort Logan, Col., which was reported as having arrived, will not be in until tomorrow morning.

Troops Pouring In. Maj. Gen. Brooke today moved his quarters from the Reed house in Chattanooga to the Chickamauga battlefield. His camp baggage and tents arrived yesterday and were placed at the point selected on the east slope of Lytle hill, and together with his staff officers, Capt. Richards and Lieut. Deane and McKenna, Gen. Brooke entered into the life of an army on the field.

The work of unloading the soldiers and their camp equipments, as they arrived at Chickamauga park today, proceeded under adverse circumstances. A heavy rain fell during the night, soaking the fields and making the clay roads slippery and places so soft as to render difficult the hauling of the heavy army wagons with their loads. But very little time was lost on this account, as fast as the troops arrived they were promptly assigned to their camping positions, their baggage unloaded and tents erected.

A notable addition was made to the forces at Chickamauga today by the arrival over the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis railway of the Ninth regiment of cavalry, from Fort Robinson, Neb. The regiment is composed exclusively of colored troops and has seen as much bitter service as any in the army.

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ANNEXATION HIS AIM

THIS REMARK ATTRIBUTED TO ADMIRAL MILLER

The Story of the Seizure of the Hawaiian Islands Credited by the Press of Honolulu—All the Coal in the Market Purchased at a Fancy Price by the United States Government.

By Associated Press. VICTORIA, B. C., April 23.—The mail steamer Waimoa left this morning after a tempestuous voyage. She left Sydney March 25 and Honolulu April 15.—She brings news from Honolulu that United States Consul Haywood has bought up all available coal at that port for the use of the United States government to meet any emergency which may possibly arise, owing to hostilities. The quantity purchased was 15,000 tons, the price paid being a very high one. The United States had already 800 tons there, but the extra supply will, the consul believes, meet all demands until more arrives.

Shipping companies will not sell any coal at any price, and the government will be required for their steamers. The big purchase of the United States has stripped the market, and it is feared steamers calling at Honolulu to coal will be compelled to return to some other port. The Hawaiian Star of April 14 says: "The Stars and Stripes may float over the government buildings at this time tomorrow. At least this afternoon information had been received that the American minister and admiral will take formal possession of the islands in the name of the United States tomorrow morning. It is impossible to find confirmation or denial of the rumor, but it comes from high authority."

TO PREVENT PANIC.

Steps Taken by the Leading Financiers of Spain to Relieve the Strain.

MADRID, April 23.—A conference of leading bankers, convened by the minister of finance, Senor Puigcerver, was held tonight, at which Senor Puigcerver appealed to the bankers to stop the hoarse panic. Those present agreed to do their utmost to bring about the desired result. About 10,000,000 pesetas has been subscribed to the fund in aid of the navy.

El Epoca (Conservative) characterizes the capture of the Buena Ventura as "an act of piracy befitting a nation which has carried on for three years filibustering against a friendly power," and says that Spain will appeal to the nations of Europe against the act, adding: "The rumored intention of the United States to supplement their inefficient blockade by means of submarine mines would be illegal."

WILL RESIGN MONDAY.

Day Fixed on Which Sherman Will Retire From the McKinley Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The Post will say tomorrow that the resignation of Hill, John Sherman as secretary of state will be placed in the hands of the president Monday.
