#### ONE KLONDIKE GOLD BRICK

FREELY DISTRIBUTED, IT IS SAID, IN MINNESOTA

Complaint Made to the Assistant County Attorney That Several Men Had Paid the Klondike-Chicago Transportation Company Money to Be Taken to Alaska and That the Concern Had Failed.

Another Klondike bubble in which a number of residents of this city were interested has burst, according to two losers by the transaction who conferred with Assistant County Attorney Zollman yesterday as to whether they had been swindled or had invested in an unsubstantial venture.

The men signed contracts with the Klondike-Chicago Transportation company last February for transportation to Dawson City, and employment for one year at \$10 per day, upon which payments of \$50 were made. The contracts were entered into through an agent of the company, who is said to have canvassed the state.

Since the contracts were signed by Williams and Sellrup, they told Zollman they have received letters from the company, but no other indication of the terms being carried out.

Among others who entered into the contracts in this city were George Nelson and C. P. Jensen. Yesterday, Mr. Sellrup received a letter from Jensen, who had gone to Seattle, stating that the company had gone to the wall. The letter further stated that the property of the company at Seattle had been taken possession of by the United States authorities, and that the chief promoter of its affairs at Seattle had disappeared.

Whether the venture was a legitimate business or not is a matter of conjecture. Some of those who advanced money on the contracts are said to be out the amounts of the payments.
