JUMPED FROM THE BRIDGE

PAUL TUSTIN DOVE 97 FEET INTO THE RIVER

In Order to Show That His Peculiar Form of Amusement Was Not Necessarily Fatal, He Turned a Back Somersault on His Way Down—Police Were Notified, but No Arrests Made.

He stood on the bridge at half-past 5 in the afternoon and jumped off. The name of him was Paul Tustin. The bridge was the Wabasha street bridge, and it occurred yesterday afternoon.

The bet was made Saturday night. Mr. Davis thinks that Mr. Tustin can jump off of pretty near any old thing, so long as there is water below. He sees Mr. Tustin jump pretty nearly every day, and believes in his capacity.

He was in the Nicollet hotel in Minneapolis Saturday night, and he went to the city and back on the water better than a dollar a foot for the descent, as it is only ninety-seven feet from the bridge to the water at the point where he made the jump.

Mr. Davis turned up at the hotel about 4 o'clock with a slightly built but athletic-looking young man of about six feet, dressed in a dark suit, and he introduced as his jumper. He said that Mr. Tustin's occupation was jumping off high towers in the circus every day, and he had been jumping for years.

How about the high bridge? asked a newspaper man, "would you mind jumping off that?"

Anything would do for Mr. Tustin, as long as it was a bridge, but Mr. McVicker didn't want to take any chances on being in at a death, and he said that the Wabasha street structure would do.

It was on Christmas day, 1886, that the last jump was made. A couple of days before Christmas he was introduced to a man named Menier who told him that he had come from Montana, that he was broke and that it would be necessary for him to raise the wind. By way of starting the rain he proposed to jump off the Wabasha street bridge on Christmas afternoon.

While Mr. McVicker was being told about this Mr. Tustin had got down on Raspberry island and had made a deal with Dave Martin, who builds boats down there, to take a boat out and pick up a man if he saw one floating in the water.

He was 8:24 when Mr. Tustin put in an appearance at the head of the steps leading down to the island. He was accompanied by a youth who carried a two-inch plank. Tustin walked across the bridge on the down river side until he got to a point about 200 feet from the bridge square end.

The diver climbed over the railing and tested the board, and then he looked at him on each side. Then he stepped to the end of the board so that his toes stuck out a couple of inches, brought his arms up over his head, and for a minute, threw his hands down then out, as a jumper would, and as he left the board he raised himself up above his head, and straightened his hands above his head, just as he began to fall.
