FOR WISHING NEW TRIAL FOR PETER NELSON. Attorney Hall Makes Up the Appeal in the Case—St. Paul Boy Quite Seriously Hurt by a Locomotive in Minneapolis—Other News of the Flour City.

The case in the appeal in the Nelson perjury was made up yesterday before the court, and Albert H. Hall filed his notice of motion for a new trial in which he recites thirteen grounds for the new trial of Peter Nelson. The majority of these exceptions are of the ordinary variety, always used in such cases, but there are a few of a more unusual character.

During the trial of the case the jury went to have a luncheon at the residence of the Durman case to take on their room. They were not certain as to how certain Mr. Nelson had been in his room on the night when they had the transcript they became very certain, and came right in with a verdict of guilty. Although the jury had no right to have any notes except those taken by the jury.

CHARLES SUNDBY FALLS TO HIS DEATH

Supposed to Have Fallen Asleep on the Sill—Milton Williams' Mother Gives Testimony Strongly in His Favor at Austin—Populists Name a Candidate for Congress in the Third District.

STILLWATER, Minn., June 14.—Charles Sundby was almost instantly killed by falling from a window in the third story of the Central house shortly before midnight yesterday. He had been employed by Tozer & Barter logging camps since last fall and came down the river yesterday.

Life was not quite extinct when he reached him, but he expired a few minutes later. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of death by accident. Relatives residing at Minneapolis were notified. It was learned late this afternoon that Sundby had resided in Anoka, and that he had been in Minneapolis for nearly twenty-five years.
