COMMERCIAL CLUB CYCLERS

HAVE THEIR FIRST RUN OF THE SEASON

LINTON BEAT TAYLOR.

Met for the Third Time at Manhattan Beach Races.

NEW YORK, June 18.—For the third time in their racing career, Linton of Wales, and Edward Taylor, of France, met this afternoon at the Manhattan Beach bicycle tracks, and this time Linton was the victor.

Taylor won the first two matches, the distance being fifty kilometers—about thirty-nine miles—which took place in Paris yesterday. The distance was thirty miles, and Linton won by 1 1/2 seconds, about 80 yards, behind the world's record, made by Eddie McPherson at Charles River park, Boston, yesterday. Maj. Taylor also took part in the one-third mile professional, in which he finished fourth. Early in the afternoon Linton rode a match race of three heats against Jaap Edt, of Holland. The colored rider made a best of July, dinner to be served there, to be followed by pyrotechnics in the evening.

Ed Tins, in a trial for the American one-kilometer record, made a new record for the distance on this side of the Atlantic by clipping one-fifth of a second off the figures made by Ed Kieser.
