BISMARCK FUNERAL SERVICE

SCENES IN DEATH CHAMBER KEPT SACREDLY SECRET

FRIEDRICHSHUHE, Aug. 2.—The grounds about Prince Bismarck's castle were thronged with people early today, crowds of Hamburgers being attracted there by the prospect of seeing the emperor. MR. SENG THREW IT AWAY

LETTER ABOUT THE STREET RAILWAY ASSESSMENT. Moritz Heim Called the Assessor's Attention to Certain Matters—He Also Communicated With the County Auditor on the Same Subject, So the Board of Equalization is Apt to Take It Up.

It is probable that the board of equalization will reach the assessment of the street railway company today, and when it is reached there is going to be something of a discussion—providing the county auditor places a communication which he received the other day from Moritz Heim before the board. Mr. Heim demands that the assessment of the company be raised to what would be an adequate valuation based upon the net earnings of the company. Mr. Heim has investigated the matter to some considerable extent.

This year he has taken the matter up at the earliest stage of proceedings, so that there will be plenty of time and he has notified the auditor and assessor that the assessment was just. It was intimated that the company might be reached today, or might be left until the end of the examination of the books.

Mr. Seng was also asked if he had received a letter from Mr. Heim on the subject. He thought for a minute and then said that he thought he had received some sort of communication a couple of weeks ago. "I don't remember much about it, but I did get a letter from Heim, said Mr. Seng. "I don't remember much about the contents; something to the effect that the street railway company should be assessed at five to six millions, and the gas company at four or five. I can't pay any attention to that sort of thing, you know, so I threw it away."

Mr. Heim wrote to the assessor is pretty thoroughly covered, in a general way in the letter, which he addressed to Mr. Sullivan, and which follows:

Dear Sir: Your attention is respectfully called to the omission of 103 miles of track and road of the St. Paul City Railway company being placed upon the assessment books for the year 1893. I addressed a letter to our county assessor dated the 25th of the month, in relation thereto, and no action has been taken. Section 1539, General Statutes Minnesota 1894, provides that the track and road of a street railway shall be assessed as real property. Section 1539, the manner and form in which such corporations shall make a return of their personal property. Such a return failed to make such return; had such been made it would necessarily contain a statement of the number of miles of street railway operated by it and the value per mile. The return of the company has been made, and the gas company provided for private individuals, where there is no mention of track and road.
