

FARNICE IS STILL IN JAIL

NO POSITIVE PROOF AGAINST THE ALLEGED FORGER. Police Satisfied That His Methods Were Irregular, and Expect to Unearth an Interesting Past—Blank Draft and Certificate of Deposit Found in the Valise of the Prisoner—Minneapolis News.

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 5.—Inquiry on the part of the police today regarding Charles J. Farnice, whose arrest was effected by Inspectors Morrissy and Stavlo Thursday night, tended to show that Farnice's methods are peculiar. That the check Thomas Lally cashed for him at the Lake Park hotel is a forgery was, however, not proved.

The police received a telegram from the Metropolitan bank of Chicago, which reads as follows: "The check of \$100,000, dated August 4, refused. Signature incorrect. Draft appears fraudulent. Insured Charles J. Farnice and Lake Park Hotel."

The check had been sent to the Chicago bank for collection, and the telegram was the reply. The officials at Chicago will trace the check to its origin. The local police expect further information tomorrow.

The detectives today bestirred themselves trying to learn Farnice's antecedents, but discovered nothing definite. In the prisoner's satchel Inspectors Morrissy and Stavlo found a list of names and addresses of the American National bank, Aurora, Ill. This was perforated for \$250. A draft, also blank, but perforated for \$250, on the American National bank, Aurora, Ill., was found with the certificate. In the satchel a quantity of type and various kinds of ink were found, giving the impression that Farnice was ready to fill in the blanks.

The police failed to find Farnice's likeness in the gallery of photographs of criminals, which is at the city hall. The man's appearance and talk indicate that he is smooth, and the police hope to learn something of his past record.

When he was approached, the prisoner maintained silence regarding himself. He said he had absolutely nothing to say. "I am a victim of circumstances, but believe that the proper time to give my story is in the court. At that time I expect to be able to clear myself."

He replied in response to a query that he had never told any one here why he had been arrested, but that he intended leaving the city at the time of his arrest, but further than that he declined to express himself. Farnice is still marked on the books of the central station.
