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BUYING COAL FOR A STATE. MINNESOTA BUYS 30,000 TONS OF IT YEARLY.

Contract Awarded for the Supply for the Coming Winter—Many Firms Among the Successful Bidders for Some Portion of What is Needed—The Price is Slightly Lower Than a Year Ago.

The state of Minnesota let contracts yesterday for enough coal to set almost anything on fire this side of the Philippines. Not that it will be willful waste, but Minnesota requires just 30,000 tons of coal every winter to run the various state institutions and the capitol building.

There is a wide range between the amounts required by the different state institutions. It only requires 400 tons of Pocahontas coal to keep the chilling blasts of the north from the chamber of the hard-working legislator, while the insane asylum at Rochester takes several carloads, in all 8,850 tons of Pocahontas coal and stove coal, to heat the institution during the winter months.
