THAT MINNEAPOLIS KICK.

Inside History of the Rumored Defeat as to Stamps. Collector of Internal Revenue Von Baumbach was not in town yesterday. He ordinarily goes out to Alexandria Friday nights in order that he may give the comfort of his presence to his subordinates and to unappreciative friends, Senator Nelson, when neighbor he. 
