

RACING MEN IN UNION

A NEW ORGANIZATION IN OPPOSITION TO THE L. A. W. FORMED

AGREEMENT LARGELY SIGNED

Trouble So Far as Trenton is Concerned Settled by the Payment of the Fines Imposed by the League, and the Races There Will Be Under Regular Auspices—Racing Men Say They Are Out for Good.

TRENTON, N. J., Sept. 26.—The American Racing Cyclists' union was formed today as an opposition racing association to the League of American Wheelmen, at a meeting, in which a number of star racers took part. Eddie Cross was made chairman, and F. Ed Spooner secretary. An executive committee, consisting of Spooner, Bald, Batchelder and Arthur Gardner, was appointed, and another meeting will be held at the Edgemoor house, Philadelphia, on Wednesday evening next, when further steps will be taken to perfect the organization of the union.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 26.—It required less than two rounds tonight at the Arena for Tom Butler, the local colored pugilist, to defeat Payne, McCoy's sparring partner, out of business. Tom was to fight six rounds. In the middle of the fight Butler deliberately forced Payne against the ropes, and in a clinch deliberately threw him out and struck him. Payne was knocked out and did not regain consciousness. Some time after he was taken to the hospital, where he was placed under a doctor's care. He was delirious and after an examination by three doctors they were unable to determine exactly what injury he had received. It was feared that concussion of the brain had resulted, and that he would hold out no hope for his recovery.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—The Phillies, after having the first game won, lost it to the Giants. In the seventh inning two hits, a wild throw by Cross and an out scored three runs, and in the eighth three hits, a passed ball and another error by Cross were good for three more. SHRINKAGE IN TOBACCO COMMON STOCK OF THREE MILLIONS

LOSS ALL INSIDE TEN DAYS

When It Was Announced the Trust Had Not Paid Cash for the Drummond Plant the Bears Made a Raid and Pounded the Price Down—Short Selling Is Reported at St. Louis.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 26.—The Republic tomorrow will say: There has been a shrinkage of over \$3,000,000 in the value of the common stock of the American Tobacco company within the last ten days. The bulk of this loss has been sustained since the negotiations for the purchase of the big Drummond plant in this city became public.
