MINNESOTA KNIGHTS

TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE GRAND LODGE OF PYTHIANS

RATHBONE SISTERS' SESSION

Both Organizations Have a Prosperous Year—The Knights Have Quite a Balance in Their Treasury—Grand Chancellor Stratton Finds Fault With Order for Releasing to Carry Risks of Soldiers.

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 27.—The twenty-sixth annual session of the grand lodge, Knights of Pythias, were addressed by Mayor Pratt and ex-Mayor Easton.

The keepers of records and assistants, F. E. Wheaton, showed the gains for the year by initiation to be \$30, by card 167, by reinstatement 94.

The total receipts for the year were \$3,766.28, balance on hand at the close of the fiscal year 1897 was \$2,644.65, making the total fund for the year \$6,410.93.

The expenses for the fiscal year closing Aug. 31, 1898, are given at \$6,264.69.

A report of the grand chancellor, Stratton takes issue with the ruling of the supreme lodge upon the question of carrying the risks of brothers who volunteered in the war with Spain. He says:

"I am free to say that I think the refusal to carry these risks was both unwise and unparliamentary. The Knights of Pythias are proverbially loyal and patriotic, and any suspicion that members of the grand lodge could not be trusted to carry and pay for the risks of our brave knights who volunteered in the American army and navy, for the defense of the honor of our country and to avenge the unjust imputation upon our brothers."

The annual inspection of the Minneapolis Mounted Commandery Knights Templars occurred today at the residence of the commander, met at their assembly, Nicollet avenue and Third street, shortly after 1 o'clock.

At 4 o'clock the parade again formed and proceeded down Hennepin avenue to Third street, to Nicollet street, to Seventh street, to Park avenue, to Lake street and to Relief hall, Lake street near Stevens avenue, where the commander passed in review before the right eminent grand commander and his staff.

At the conclusion of the inspection a banquet was partaken of in Relief hall.

In the evening the inspection of the commandery took place, and the degree of the temple was conferred upon George W. Jones, in the usual manner in which the work was done.

Following this a social session was held, concluding late in the evening.

THE RATHBONE SISTERS.

The Rathbone Sisters, in session today, transacted considerable business of importance, listening to and adopting the reports of the grand officers and much miscellaneous work.

From the report of grand chief, Mrs. Mary T. Earhart, the following is gleaned: The order has now in good standing 634, of whom 334 are sisters and 305 knights.

The report further shows that the order is in a flourishing and prosperous condition, and has a net gain of twenty-two members during the fiscal year just closed.

At the morning session the address of welcome was delivered by Sister Lettie Godfrey.

In response Sister Lulu M. Stanton, of Appleton, spoke.

The morning's work was the presentation of a beautiful bouquet of roses from Geoffrey Temple No. 5 and North Star Temple No. 10, to the grand officers.

The afternoon meeting was principally given up to the reading and adoption of reports, chief among which were those of the grand chancellor and grand keeper of records and seal, extracts from which are given elsewhere.

Grand representatives to the supreme convention at Indianapolis, J. T. Hilscher and his wife, presented a most complete and satisfactory report of the proceedings of that convention. All reports were unanimously adopted.

Supreme Vice Chancellor Ogden H. Fothergill, of Janesville, Wis., gave a most excellent address upon general topics connected with the welfare of the order, and was most heartily received.

The grand officers of the Rathbone Sisters rested from the duties of the convention late in the afternoon, and the attention to the members of the order and their friends. The parlors of the West hotel were the handsome meeting place of seventy-five women who received the greetings of the officers. The decorations were in large palms and flags for draperies, and the parlor suite was in the most attractive appearance.

The occasion was quite informal and designed only to bring those in attendance into the convention together in a social way.

The convention today will receive the supreme officers from Kansas City, St. Paul, St. Joseph, Mo., and St. Louis, Mo. Mrs. M. D. Wood, supreme mistress of records and correspondence. No formal social courtesies will be extended to them, owing to the tardy knowledge of their coming.

SCHOOL BOND ISSUE.

One Is Proposed for the Election of New Buildings.

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 27.—The board of education is going to make another effort to secure a school bond issue for \$200,000. It will proceed as it did two years ago—petition the city council to place the proposition before the voters at the coming election.

At the meeting of the board of education, the income of the board was discussed, but the council would not see the stipulated matter never got any further. The matter was the untimely closing of the school last spring.

The matter came before the board at its meeting yesterday afternoon, through a resolution offered by Director F. W. Payne. The resolution is as follows:

"Resolved, That the board of education petition the city council to place the proposition of the school bond issue for \$200,000 before the voters at the coming election, and that the income of the board be increased by one-half day's schooling, owing to the lack of accommodations, and that the income of the board of education from all sources be used to meet current expenses, notwithstanding the

reduction in expenditures that have been made by the board this year.

Whereas, The way in which new buildings can be erected next year is by an issue of bonds, and that the city council be authorized to place upon the ticket to be voted upon at the next election, a proposition to issue school bonds for \$200,000 for the purpose of purchasing real estate for school purposes, and for the purpose of constructing, erecting, improving, repairing, furnishing and equipping school houses and buildings, and that the typographical union has no objection to the board performing its own work in this manner.
