ONLY AIM OF THE OLD SOLDIERS' CLUB OF MINNEAPOLIS

REPLY TO SOME CRITICISMS

Which the Republican Press has hurled at the Veterans' Organization—Facts about the Appointment of Stanley—Parading His Generosity to Butter Post of Minneapolis.

To The St. Paul Globe:

In the press of Minneapolis there appear at frequent intervals scurrilous attacks upon the "Old Soldiers' Anti-Eustis Club," because they refuse to support a man for governor whom they believe to be wholly unfitted for that office, both by character and disposition and his well-known unfitness to the old soldier, who is serving a term as mayor of this city.

JUDGE WILLIS SAYS THE STATE TICKET IS IN GREAT FAVOR

REPUBLICANS FEELING SAD

Minneapolis Begins a Spy System at State League Headquarters—Merry Contest in County Committee—An Incident Showing the Necessity of a Change in Grain Inspection.

Judge John W. Willis, who has for several days engaged in a canvass of the Fourth congressional district, returned yesterday for a short stay at home. Judge Willis says that the conditions in the various counties of this district are even more hopeful than he had expected. He believes that he entered upon the campaign as a candidate for congress, but that he is now a candidate for the state ticket.

"I think a grave mistake was made in nominating Eustis," said a prominent Minneapolis Republican yesterday. "I preferred Van Sant, but when it became apparent to me that the Winona county ticket would be given to Eustis, I thought I would try to get Van Sant elected. I have many friends, and I have thrown my strength to Collins. But they would not do it. They said, 'We are in this fight for Van Sant, and we will not be a mistake. When Eustis gets in he will give them any credit. If Lind gets in, we will have the assurance that there is a man in power whose record is known to every citizen in the state. We understand I am a Republican. I am going to vote for Eustis. But I am not but believe that the party did make a mistake in nominating Eustis. He is a man with so many adverse elements contend with, and that, too, against one of the best campaigners in the state, for there never was any question of his being elected, and would be nominated by the Democrats under the circumstances.'"

The Fourth district Democratic congressional committee will hold a meeting this afternoon at its rooms in the Davidson block. All reports to Secretary Bailey predict a large Democratic vote in the district. The committee is being centered on the cities, St. Paul and Stillwater, which the Republicans are making great efforts to win. Fred C. Stevens, lately connected with the Minnesota Savings bank, which failed, leaving several hundred widows and orphans practically penniless.

The Republican league, of which F. B. Wright, of Minneapolis, is president, has established headquarters in the Endicott building. Wright says he will be there every day. The Minneapolis Republicans have thought that Fred S. Bryant, the secretary of the league, was playing into the hands of the St. Paul interests, rather than working purely for the party, and they have set Mr. Wright to watch him. Wright is a Minneapolis lawyer, who is in a session now, and after court opens some one else will probably be sent over.

Steve Lovejoy and Frank Farham are the only ones mentioned for the position of chief clerk. The Republican county committee organized yesterday. There was a merry contest over the secretaryship, and a technicality as to whether the Republican custom would permit them to elect Bryant again or not. This was brought in by the secretary, John Selb, and they were so insistent on it that Bryant's friends finally threw up the sponge.

"One of them had enough knocking against Bryant." He has taken the lion's share of the work here for the last three or four years, and now just before the election he is being set aside. His fellows want to ring Selb in as secretary. What has Selb ever done. Of course he's a decent fellow, and he's a man that don't count in the Republican party. I can see a lot of you fellows out sweating your shirts off from this out. But that's what you'll have to do. If you think you can do it, and you can't, you'll be looking after the details of the campaign over here for the last four or five years. It's a hard job, and it's a little of the conceit taken out of you."

Steve Picha was made chairman. There was some objection to the election of Steve on the ground that he had never been known outside of his precinct until he had been elected in Israel until his beard was grown, but Steve landed the election just the same. The wisdom of the state Democratic campaign, and the People's party as well, in confining the issues to state matters is daily being demonstrated. The meeting has arranged his engagements so as to be present on the occasion, it not having been practicable to secure the presence of Mr. Lind. The Democratic county convention is to be held that day, and the rally is to be in the evening, and it is determined to have the largest union rally that has ever been held in Wright county. People will be well pleased to see the Soo road has agreed to give reduced rates for the territory extending from Glenwood on the west to Minneapolis on the east. The rate will be a round trip, on the certificate plan. Delegates to the county convention, as well as those attending the night meeting, can avail themselves of the reduction.
