LEUT. HUMPHREY AT WALKER HAS NOT ASKED FOR MORE TROOPS

BACON SAYS NOTHING NEW At Washington Official Reports Indicate That There Will Be No Serious Trouble, Though Officials Are Worried by Press Dispatches and Will Take No Chances—Situation Much the Same at Walker.

There was considerable commotion at Fort Snelling yesterday, the portent of the reports from Walker appearing in the morning papers being such as to indicate that additional troops might be needed to suppress the trouble.

The officers were in waiting for a communication from Lieut. Humphrey all day, it being anticipated that he might urge the sending of a larger force to quell the uprising.

Up to a late hour last night, however, no such message had been received, and it was felt that the reports had been exaggerated.

Gen. John M. Bacon, in charge of the department of Dakota, said at midnight that there was absolutely nothing new in the situation at all.

WALKER, Minn., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—The situation is practically unchanged here today. It is understood that Lieut. Humphrey expects more troops, but how many and when they will arrive are details not known.

Developments of importance are expected until after the conference with the chiefs tomorrow. There are still many sensational rumors, but it is believed that the chances of trouble are rapidly decreasing.

OFFICIAL REPORTS PACIFIC. All Agree That No Serious Trouble Is Likely at Leech Lake.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—The Interior department authorities fear the situation in the White Earth Indian reservation in Minnesota may be serious, notwithstanding official reports to them state that no trouble is apprehended.

They base this on press dispatches, for Acting Secretary of the Interior Ryan has received a dispatch from Indian Agent Snatter, in charge of the Indians, announcing that everything is quiet and that there is no apprehension of trouble, either on Bear Island or Leech lake.

A dispatch of similar tenor has also been sent by Indian Inspector Tinker, located at that point, and the official report to the war department also expresses the opinion that no danger is to be apprehended.

The department will watch matters closely to prevent trouble.

Artificial Respiration Saved Him. AUSTIN, Minn., Oct. 2.—Harry Ward, a young man residing near this city, is slowly recovering from the effects of a dose of laudanum, self-administered, with intent to commit suicide.

Ward purchased the laudanum, stating that he wanted to apply it to a felon on his thumb. Later he drank enough of the stuff to kill ten men, and was found in an unconscious condition.

All efforts to get him out of his system with emetics failed. A number of physicians worked over him for twelve hours, keeping him alive by means of artificial respiration.

They were rewarded at the end of that time, and it is now thought that he will entirely recover.

He was tired of life and would give no other reason for wanting to end his existence.

SATCHEL FOR TOMBSTONE. Monument That Marks the Grave of a Roving Kansas Lad.

LINCOLN, Kan., Sept. 30.—Henry Jacobs, an eccentric citizen of Lincoln, Kan., has what may be called original mortuary ideas. The illustration represents the tombstone which he has recently erected in memory of his son, James Jacobs, who died in 1871.

The stone is of white marble, set on a sandstone base. It is cut in the exact shape of an old-fashioned traveling satchel.
