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ON TO PORTO-RICO.

Two Regiments Sail From New York and Newport for San Juan. WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Adj. Gen. Corbin this evening received the following telegram from Col. Tyson, commanding the Sixth United States Infantry:

Brooklyn, N. Y., Oct. 9.—Adjutant General, Washington: Telegram directing me to proceed to San Juan, Porto Rico, received, Leave today, 4 p. m.; 70 men, 38 officers on board transport steamship Mississippi.

Information also reached the war department this morning that the Forty-seventh New York had sailed for San Juan on the transport Minnevaska from Newport, R. I.

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ESCAPING SOLDIER SHOT.

Attempted to Elude the Guards and Was Killed by a Rifle Bullet. NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Thomas Greenwald, a private in Battery I, Seventh artillery, was shot and instantly killed last night while trying to escape from Fort Slocum, near New Rochelle.

Private James Coates, of the same battery, was shot and wounded after firing on the sentry box and striking him, but was arrested before he got away.

Greenwald and Coates had been in the guard house for two days past, but escaped from there, and, having secured civilian's clothing, attempted to make good their escape from the fort.

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OUT OF MANZANILLO.

The City Will Be Turned Over to the American Authorities Today. MANZANILLO, Oct. 8.—(Delayed in Transmission).—The Spanish troops expect to leave Manzanillo tomorrow.

General Bernal, the Spanish commander, will turn the city over to the city of Mexico, making the official transfer to Col. Ray, representative of the United States, on Monday, Oct. 9.

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
