The Odds Are in Favor of the Pennsylvania Eleven, Though the Harvard Are Expected to Put Up a Great Game—An Even Dozen Contests Are on the Schedule for This Afternoon.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Tomorrow, for the first time this season, eleven of the "Big Four" will meet on the grid-iron. Pennsylvania and Harvard will be the contestants, and the whole football world will have its eyes on Cambridge until the result is known. Among experts opinion generally favors the Quakers, though it is admitted that the crimson will make a hard fight, and before the game begins it is likely to be even. Additional interest attaches to the game as the result of a report that the Harvard men have a defensive plan that is expected to break up the guards line formation upon which Pennsylvania so largely depends.

The practice at Cambridge has, of course, been exact for the last few days, and the large batches of "inside information" which emanate from the crimson campus must be taken with the usual amount of caution. The quakers are practicing where no curious eye can penetrate. It is said that Coach Woodruff has decided to present practically the same line-up and formation as that which met the University of Chicago team last Saturday. There is a possibility that, although the team will be intact, the men will be changed around slightly. Whatever transformation it will be will remain a mystery until the men face the crimson.

At the other end of the line will be Hedges, who contributed in a large measure to the defeat of the crimson last year. At quarter back will be missed. At full back Minds has left a vacant place that certainly none of the numerous successors has been able to fill.

The condition of the Harvard team is really better than it ever has been since the time of the big game. Never has a Harvard captain been charged to point to a list of men in which he did not have a cripple. In former times the "crumple brigade" has been one of the big features of the Harvard aggregation. Much of this has been ascribed to the training methods of Jack MacMasters, who has become the authority on everything relating to condition about Cambridge.

BOLD WITNESS WAS HE

BRUTAL ASSAULT ON A YOUNG GIRL ON SEVENTH STREET LAST EVENING

NETTIE PARKER'S ADVENTURE

Fourteen-Year-Old Girl in Attacked by a Well-Dressed Young Fellow While Returning From a Store Near Her Home but a Little After 8 O'Clock—Assaultant Has Not Been Captured.

Nettie Parker, a fourteen-year-old girl, living at 852 Phalen avenue, was the victim of a brutal assault at Seventh and Atlantic streets shortly after 8 o'clock last evening. The girl escaped without serious injury beyond the nervous fright resulting from a desperate struggle with the ruffianly assailant. Her face was scratched and bruised somewhat, however, and her clothing was torn. The police are looking for the assailant, and, if found, he will be charged with an attempt at a serious crime.

The girl was attacked while going home from a store on Seventh street, near Atlantic, where she had been sent to purchase some milk. She noticed a man watching her from across the street when she left the store and saw him start to follow her. She ran to her home, but he followed her to the sidewalk. The girl struggled to the full extent of her feeble power. The brute attempted to drag his unwilling victim into the lot, choking her helplessly to prevent her calling for help. So desperately did the girl struggle, however, that she managed to loosen the grasp about her throat for an instant, and in that brief moment the cries were heard by several boys in the vicinity, who rushed to the spot. The brute released the girl as the boys ran up and took to their heels.

When her young rescuers leaned over the girl they found her almost overcome. Assistance was summoned, and she was taken to her home, where about the girl's face were several scratches and a bruise or two, as though the man had struck her with his fists, while her throat was so choked that she was struggling to which she had been subjected. Her clothing was disarranged and part of her apparel almost torn off.

In the struggle the man lost his hat, which is an ordinary black derby. The police hope this may aid to establish the identity of the girl's assailant. Miss Parker was so overcome that she could scarcely describe the man who attacked her. He was fairly well dressed, and in dark clothing, and was apparently in the middle of twenty-two years of age, dark complexion, smooth face, short, heavy build, and wore a long dark overcoat.

BROADWAY LOOP HEARING.

It is Postponed a Week for Further Argument.

The mandamus proceedings commenced by the city to compel the street railway company to construct and operate the Broadway loop came up before Judge Robinson yesterday. City Attorney Markham and Assistant Attorney Taylor appeared for the city; M. D. Munn for the railway company, and J. O'Brien for the intervenors. The hearing was postponed a week for further argument.

The attorneys for the parties favoring the present loop on Robert street and Broadway desired to be heard in the case. Mr. Markham contended that this case had no material bearing on the only issue being whether the company should obey the order of the council or not.

The court adjourned the hearing after Mr. Markham had presented the case on the part of the city until Thursday, when a decision as to the admission of testimony by the intervenors on Robert street and Broadway will be rendered.
