WOMEN OF THE FOURTEENTH WILL GET TWO DAYS' LEAVE

They will have a trip to their homes, the privilege of voting and a welcome change of scene—Gov. Clough is looking after the arrangements for their transportation.

WELCOME NEWS FOR TROOPS

The men of the Fourteenth regiment will be allowed to go to their homes Tuesday to vote. Adjutant General Corbin yesterday wired to Col. Johnson notifying him that passes would be granted for forty-eight hours to such men as wanted to go to their homes to cast their ballot on Tuesday, and in accordance with that agreement Gov. Clough notified Col. Johnson that all who wished transportation would receive it from him at the state capitol tomorrow.

The soldiers were greatly elated when they learned of the fact that they are all anxious to get out of their present quarters, if even only for a day. The chance of voting is secondary to their desire to break the monotony of life in barracks.

In accordance with the action of the assembly Thursday night coats have been obtained for nearly all the soldiers who needed them. Company G, of Duluth, is now the only company that is not provided with straw ticks or coats. That company is still sleeping on the drill room floor at the armory, but Col. Johnson hopes to get coats for the men tomorrow.

There have been no more complaints by the men regarding rations. All the restaurants where the men are boarding are giving satisfactory service now. The proprietors have learned that the men know when they are being ill-treated and that they cannot palm off poor food for good. Some of the men used to eat even before they entered the volunteer service, and the restaurant keepers are now convinced of it.

The examination of Company D was completed last evening. The men showed up to good advantage, only about 15 per cent of them claiming disability on account of service. The medical corps was reduced yesterday by the sudden recall of Capt. Calne to New Ulm. Capt. Calne is a surgeon in the Twelfth regiment and was ordered to report immediately to Col. Boller. Capt. Calne went to New Ulm without delay.

Nearly all the captains have submitted their pencil copy of their muster rolls to Lieut. Stie. When they have been corrected and approved the captains must make five duplicate copies in ink. This work will take at least two weeks. The muster rolls could be mustered out before Nov. 20.

The soldiers are expected to attend service in the various churches today. They will make no church in full companies, if possible. The sick list is still large. Colds are the principal complaints.

IN THE NEW GUARD.
