Public Opinion Needed. Mayor Kiefer says it must be behind enforcement of law. Report of the Conference Held With City Officials by a Committee From the Zueblin Study Class—Rubbish Cans to Be Located. Thomas Cochran, for the committee appointed by Prof. Zueblin's lecture class to wait upon the mayor in regard to the enforcement of certain ordinance, has reported as follows: Your committee appointed to interview the mayor with regard to the enforcement of the ordinance making it unlawful to deposit rubbish being thrown into the street would report as follows: The section particularly applying to this subject reads as follows: That no person shall throw or deposit any dirt, paper or filth, the sweepings of any house, store, shop or office, or any ashes, shavings, filthy water, oil, straw, wood, stumps, or any other refuse, into any gutter, on, or into any street, sidewalk, lane, alley or public ground of the city.
