PAKING UP AN INDIAN

TILMAN KNAPP, WHO FOR FORTY YEARS RESIDED IN MINNEAPOLIS

DEATH DUE TO PNEUMONIA

Took an Active Part in Promoting the Work of the Catholic Church—He Helped to Build St. Joseph's Church and Was One of the Trustees—The News of the Flour City.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 20.—The passing from life of Tilman Knapp occurred at 2 p. m. Saturday at the family residence in Richfield township. He was ill two weeks with pneumonia. His end came peacefully, and his passing away was met with a fitting funeral of a life passed in doing good and in advancing the interests of the community in which he lived so long and to so good purpose.

Tilman Knapp was seventy years old, and for forty years lived in the vicinity of where he died. He saw St. Anthony's parish grow from a trading post to become a city of Minneapolis today. He took an active part in promoting the work of the Catholic church here. He was a prominent factor in the building of St. Joseph's church, and was long one of its trustees. St. John's college, located at St. Cloud, received material aid from him in its upbuilding. The school at Minnesota, conducted under the auspices of St. Joseph's society, was promoted with his aid. He was one of the founders of St. Mary's society, as well as of the Society of St. Joseph, and the school conducted by it. By occupation he was a farmer, but much of his time was given to promoting church work and the college and enterprises.

A son, Father Raphael, is one of the professors at St. John's college, St. Cloud, an institution that stands much to credit to his father's name and his aid. The funeral occurs Tuesday morning at St. Joseph's church, Fourth street, at ten o'clock. The Rev. Father Knapp will be under the auspices of St. Joseph's society. Interment will be at St. Mary's cemetery.

INDIANS HAVE ENOUGH.

Pilgrims Will Never Seek New Trouble With Uncle Sam.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 20.—Timber cutting on the Leech Lake reservation will be resumed in a few days. The Indians are left there, notwithstanding the late Indian trouble. Such is the opinion of A. McBride, of Walker, now in Minneapolis on a visit. Mr. McBride is assistant commissioner and deputy county auditor for Cass county, and is well informed as to matters on and near the Leech Lake reservation.

Asked if resumption of timber cutting on the land of the Indians would not renew the old Leech Lake troubles, he replied that the soldiers and Pilgrim Indians at Sugar Point, McBride said he thought the Indians would never again engage in such a battle with soldiers.

He believed that the Pilgrim band had not the right attitude of mind with the Indian of regulars, in his opinion the system under which dead and downy men are cut with their rifles, and that the Indians will not make strenuous objection to removing timber from their lands.

NEWS OF RAILROADS

ISANTI COUNTY IS TO GET ITS FIRST LINE THIS WINTER

THE COON CREEK CUT-OFF

Line Proposed by the Great Northern Will Be a Boon for the Farmers in the Country Through Which It Will Pass—After the Scalers—Change in Time on the Burlington.

H. C. Head, who represented Mill Lake county in the last legislature, but who was defeated for re-election, and ran independent, was in the city last night to meet Senator Buckman, of Little Falls, with whom he is interested in a pine stumpage in that county.

"The construction of the Coon Creek and Brook Park cut-off by the Great Northern railroad is a great boon to the farmers and day laborers along the proposed line," said Mr. Head.

The past week the railroad company has been unloading dump cars, ties, rails and other construction outfit. Farmers have been engaged with their teams to haul these into the country, and will have work for some time. All the day laborers and contractors on other places along the line have secured employment.

Work will be carried on all winter, making cuts and fills. Foley Bros., contractors for the work, have agreed to have the line ready for operation in the spring.

The new line will shorten the distance between the Twin Cities and Duluth thirty miles. The cut-off runs through Anoka, Isanti and Pine counties.

HARD AFTER THE SCALPER.

Central Committee Is Spreading Information In All Eastern Cities.

CHICAGO, Nov. 18.—(Special.)—Business interests of Pittsburgh have become thoroughly aroused to the evils of ticket scalping. At a meeting of the transportation committee of the Pittsburgh chamber of commerce the question of general consideration. A. M. Conferences such as were held at Pittsburgh have been arranged for in the cities of Cleveland, Indianapolis, Cincinnati, St. Louis, St. Paul and St. Peter. It will be made to arouse the same deep interest which has been shown in other large cities and to bring about prompt action to suppress the anti-scalping bill, not so much for the benefit of the railroads as for that of the merchants.

Change in Time.

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 20.—The change was made today in the schedule of the Chicago special of the Burlington route. The train heretofore left Denver at 10:30 a. m. and arrived at Chicago the following afternoon. It now leaves Denver at 1:40 p. m., arriving at Omaha early the next morning, and at Chicago at 8:15. The train runs 1,046 miles in twenty-nine and one-half hours, maintaining an average speed of thirty-six miles an hour.

BUYING IN ACRES.

John D. Rockefeller Improving His Home Near Cleveland.

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 19.—Mr. John D. Rockefeller is an important move this week. He has just completed the purchase of a large tract of land in the East for the West. He purchased 100 acres of land adjoining his residence, Forest Hill, and will at once begin its improvement.

This is the most important of a series of purchases on the multi-millionaire has made during the last few months. Wherever there is a parcel of land for sale within five miles of Forest Hill it is purchased by the agents of Mr. Rockefeller, until now the surrounding territory is a perfect patchwork which is slowly but surely being made a solid adjunct to the standard Ohio magnate's estate.

Mr. Rockefeller is not pleased with the New York assessors. He believes his property at Tarrytown has been unjustly taxed, and at one time he actually contemplated allowing the state to take the property for taxes.

Ten years ago he left Cleveland because of the high tax on his property. He now contemplates leaving New York for reason of the extensive taxation on real estate.

His departure from Cleveland took place at the same time scores of other Clevelanders, including Col. John Hey, the present secretary of state, left here. Under the so-called Morganthau law the tax on the property of the richest men in Ohio into New York and other Eastern cities.

The Rockefeller residence at Forest Hill is situated on a high hill, just across of the corporate limits of Cleveland, overlooking the waters of Lake Erie on the north. It now contains, including the stock of furniture and other effects, and is worth \$1,500,000. Nearly twenty miles of macadamized roadway, constructed especially for bicycle riding, surrounds the estate.

Mr. Rockefeller also owns a home at the corner of Euclid and Case avenues, in this city, which he occupies, when here, generally in the winter months, for the sole purpose of being within convenient reach of the Euclid Avenue Baptist church on Sunday.

DEATHS OF A DAY.
