MAY CLOSE GAMBLERS MINNEAPOLIS POLICE HAVE FULL POWER OVER THE GREEN CLOTH FRATERNITY CITY ORDINANCE IS VALID Supreme Court So Held in a Decision Handed Down Yesterday—There Were No Reversals in the Batch Given Out to the Judges Yesterday—One as to Rights of Banks.

The Minneapolis police have authority to close every gambling house in Minneapolis. At least they would have the sanction of the state supreme court in taking such a course. The Minneapolis ordinance, which prohibits the operation of gambling devices was yesterday declared constitutional by the state's highest tribunal. The case upon which the decision was given was that of the State against James Grimes, Thomas Murphy and Eugene Farrell, who kept a gambling house in the Harmonia building. The court, in paying its compliments to the trio of defendants, says: "The evidence shows that the appellants' business was a dirty and dishonest gambling scheme. The decision was written by Judge Start, and sustains the ordinance in every particular."

CAN PROVE AN ALIBI. How Knuth Proposes to Meet the Charge of the Police. The continued examination of Nicholas Knuth, accused of the theft of Arthur Middleton's watch, did not take place in the municipal court yesterday, but was postponed until today. The continuance was at the request of the defense, whose witnesses were unable to be in court. Knuth's defense against the efforts of the police to connect him with the Middleton murder, will be the establishment of an alibi. He says he can easily prove his whereabouts on the night of the murder and substantiate his story that he received the watch from Harry Edmunds.

CASE OF SOUTHALL. Motion in Arrest of Judgment to Be Made Today. J. H. Southall will come up for sentence in Judge Britton's court this morning. A motion in arrest of judgment will be taken and a stay asked for. The case will go to the supreme court at once, on the motion to declare the verdict null and void. The sentence that must be imposed under the finding of the jury must be between one and ten years.

BOTH ARE BOUND OVER. Keough and O'Connell Held to the Grand Jury for Burglary. Martin Keough and John O'Connell were in a preliminary hearing in the police court yesterday and bound over to the grand jury to answer to the charge of burglary in the case of a tailor shop, 401 University avenue, several weeks ago. The store was robbed of \$200 worth of clothing, most of which has been recovered.

Miss Nelson Won Her Point. The fact that Pherson, the furniture dealer at Seventh and Jackson streets, accused Miss Nelson of larceny and an evening before last in the municipal court yesterday, in the matter which was without foundation has caused Miss Nelson a good deal of worry. She is a widow and has a young child and is obliged to earn her own living. She had no intention of wronging any one, and she is now in a very anxious state of mind. Her attorney, Mr. J. H. Smith, has accepted Miss Nelson's terms by paying the court costs and paying the dollar besides footing expenses, and not as stated in the evening paper.
