Mr. Chambers gave out a ticket for taking down the bet, that the man for whom he had made it had failed to "make good," and he did not care to take chances. Now the facts are that Col. Hopkins has an idea that Jim Corbett is invincible. He would not bet his money on Sharkey on a guess. He would not fail to "make good." Then, why did he bet on Sharkey, and then hedge out? The incident is causing all sorts of talk here. It is regarded as additional evidence that the close friends of Corbett know which way the cat was going to jump.

**CHAINLESS WHEELS WORK**

"Chic" Paquin Lowered Walker's 200-Mile Record by Nine Minutes.

"Chic" Paquin, an amateur rider of Fall River, Mass., started on Wednesday, Nov. 23, to break the 200-mile American record held by "Dutch" Frank Walker, the famous long-distance rider and one of the prospective contestants in the coming six-day race at Madison Square Garden, in New York.

Walker's record of 13 hours 4 minutes and 47 seconds was made over the twenty-five-mile Norwood course last summer on a chain wheel under favorable conditions. Paquin, mounted on a Columbia level gear chainless bicycle, rode over the Stoughton-Easton-Brookline course, lowering Walker's record by 9 minutes and 47 seconds. It is said that the course over which Paquin rode measures 20.5 miles, and that he rode 208 miles instead of 200, and thus, in fact, lowered Walker's record by more than the official figures indicate.

Paquin went down to Stoughton the night before last, and the start was promptly made at 6:30 in the morning. Paquin, riding the pace of the fastest rider in the world, who had gone the last miles of the journey with a steady and rapid pace, he received quite an ovation from the great crowd of spectators.

Paquin said he felt well, and remarked that he could go another hundred miles on the chainless without trouble. He did not meet with any accident during his long ride, over practically unknown roads. The following riders rode him on tandem over the various parts of the course: Beauregard and Gaudin, Dan, Padin and James M. Martin Jr., Joseph Turgon and Jacob Desrosiers, of the Fall River, and Barber and Chace, from Taunton.

A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring officers of the club for their successful management of affairs which had left a surplus in the treasury for the first time in the history of the organization.

Hercher Johnston spoke of the members of the club who are absent in the army service, and a resolution was passed instructing the secretary to write a letter of greeting to M. A. Emond, C. M. Barlow, E. D. Belden, A. Emond, W. R. Stevenson, Ed Good and Ed Beon at Manila, and to T. W. Griggs, with the Fifteenth regiment.

Treasurer Van Bergen submitted his annual report showing that after paying all expenses of the last bonspiel, the current expenses to date and \$180 of old indebtedness, the club is still in debt with a cash balance of \$35 still in the treasury.

Judge Cory suggested that immediate action should be taken in regard to fixing the date for the bonspiel, and after some discussion it was decided to leave the matter in the hands of the executive committee, which will meet either today or Saturday to fix the date.

It appeared that a number of the medals which were intended for the carnival bonspiel are still left in the hands of the committee and it was suggested that they would be available for the coming bonspiel. It has long been the opinion of sporting men and especially those who patronize boxing contests, that the present rules were incomplete and indefinite and that a change was needed for the better. The rule which will cover the acts of the seconds in jumping into the ring is as follows:

"No second should have the right to acknowledge defeat or compromise the contest without first consulting the referee."

Hereafter if a second enters the ring to claim a foul he will be ejected and permanently barred from the club, while the referees are ordered to proceed.
