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REPORTS IN WASHINGTON

MONTH OF NOVEMBER GRATIFYING

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Smaller Amount of Liabilities Than in Any Other Month, Excepting Three in Summer, Since the Monthly Record Began—Big Gains in the Iron and Steel Industry—Wool Market Improves.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade will say tomorrow: The report of failures for the month of November is extremely gratifying, because it shows not only a decrease in number and a smaller amount of liabilities than in any other month, excepting three in summer, since the monthly record began—Big gains in the iron and steel industry, and a marked improvement in the wool market.

DELAY EXPLAINED.

A dozen telegrams explain the sudden detention of the expedition ordered to the report of the fictitious Spanish squadron in Nicholas channel. In the midst of them appear these telegrams which have not before been published:

Headquarters of the Army, Tampa, Fla., June 9, 8:50 p. m. Secretary of War, Washington, D. C. Think it would be well to announce to the army on board transports what has happened on the coast of Cuba. Say nothing about its being recalled, but let our transports go over the course that our hope of finding those Spanish ships. Does not seem to be a very good one. The Cuban waters render it extremely hazardous to send troops on transports until they are captured, destroyed or driven away? And under the circumstances it is expected I shall organize expedition No. 2? Arrangements had been made for the presence of the Spanish ships was announced.

"Miles, Major General Commanding Army."
