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INDIANS TO BLAME

SPECIAL AGENTS OF GOVERNMENT REPORT ON THE CHIPPEWA TIMBER TROUBLES

CAUSE OF OUTBREAK NOT DUE TO LOGGING

COMPLAINTS OF THE RED MEN ARE SAID TO BE NOT WELL FOUNDED ON FACTS

NO EVIDENCE FOUND OF UNFAIR TREATMENT

Chippewa Reported as a Troublesome Lot, Barring the Full-Bloods Who Have Accepted Civilization—Foremen in the Timber Country Complain of the Inefficiency of the Indian Workmen.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—Special Agents Parke and Schwartz, of the general land office, who have been investigating the logging of the dead and down timber on the ceded lands of the Chippewa reservation, in Minnesota, have made their report to Commissioner Hermann.

They say the charge that the logging operations on the Leech Lake reservation were largely the cause of the Indian outbreak fails of confirmation, and that the cause of the war originated fully forty years ago. It is well known, they say, that the war was used by influential lumbermen, disaffected applicants for logging permits, and half-breed disturbers, to bring the situation and say the real trouble was unfulfilled promises, violated treaties and mismanagement.

The Indians are complaining of the expense of estimating timber and of the conduct of mixed blood deputy marshals in making arrests for minor offenses, taking Indians to distant points for hearing, and on acquittal leaving them to get home as best they can, but the conclusion is reached that no system can be adopted that will satisfy all.

WORK FOR BRAVES.

The agents found no instance of Indians being unfairly treated or refused work, but 30 per cent of the loggers were Indians, they receiving \$1 a day, while the whites only \$18 a month; that at the last settlement 80 per cent of their labor bill was paid and upwards earned by these Indian laborers last winter is worth more to them, the value of all the logs cut.

The foremen complain that the Indian labor is unskillful.

The agents report that in many cases the Indians receive reward for the use of their names to secure logging permits, suggest that this leaves the door open for fraud, and recommend placing a government inspector to control the labor and supply charges and proper rules.

The report says that the full-bloods who have adopted a civilized way and are practically half-breeds are satisfied with the present timber system, and, if not interfered with, four-fifths of the Indians are stated to favor logging this season, which the agents recommend.

The agents, however, say that many full-bloods, emboldened by the result of the recent outbreak, say there will be no logging at Leech lake Chief Red Blood threatens to remove all outfits from the reservation, and, if the loggers commence operations, and the Indians will follow suit.

At the White Earth reservation Chief Bay-ke-no-wish is making similar threats concerning that reserve. He claims there is a compact between the White Earth, Leech lake, Cass lake and Red Lake Indians to prevent logging.

Several Indians came to notify the agents that logging operations on the Red lake reserve will be stopped if attended this winter. They are likely to cause trouble, according to the agents, if they are not made to realize that the close of the recent war with them was not brought about through any fears of the government.

BAD FOR MRS. BOTKIN.

Ugly Testimony Brought Out in the Dover Poisoning Case.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 16.—Today was an exceedingly bad one for the defense in the Botkin murder case.

Two important witnesses appeared against Mrs. Botkin. One of them was Mrs. Grace Harris, a saleswoman in a local dry goods house. Mrs. Harris positively identified Mrs. Botkin as the person to whom she sold a cheap green handkerchief. It was the one sent to Mrs. Dunning for her little daughter.

Mrs. Rouff, a friend of eight years, testified that Mrs. Botkin pointed out the handkerchief to her, asking if it was not a cheap one for the money.

Mrs. Rouff also identified Mrs. Botkin's handwriting on the anonymous letters sent to Mrs. Dunning. She pointed out the similarities with the precision of a handwriting expert.

Mrs. Rouff told of a conversation she had with the defendant on different poisons and their calculations for killing mice. She told of a visit to her Stockton home shortly after the perpetration of the crime. Mrs. Botkin was greatly excited and talked about poisons, anonymous letters and made other remarks that puzzled Mrs. Rouff.

On one occasion Mrs. Botkin talked to the witness about bleaching hats and remarked that she had heard that arsenic was used for that purpose. Defendant became agitated when informed by Mrs. Rouff that she would have to give her name when she purchased the poison.

Several other witnesses were called, but nothing of great importance was brought out.

The court then adjourned until Monday.
