TONKA CLUB HOUSE.

Meeting of Business Held to Discuss the Project. MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 16.—An effort is being made to establish a Town and Country club and build for it a handsome home at Minnetonka Beach, near the site of the Hotel Lafayette, recently destroyed by fire, and also to persuade President James J. Hill, of the Great Northern railroad, to rebuild that hotel.

A meeting was held tonight at the West, which was attended by over thirty-five business men of Minneapolis, nearly all of whom have cottages at Lake Minnetonka. P. H. Peavey presided, and all present seemed generally in favor of the handsome club house at Minnetonka Beach. The plan has had endorsement from James J. Hill, who has been even about the matter, but the decision is not yet made. It was suggested that the Great Northern rebuild the Lafayette. The plan is to raise the money by subscription, assisted in rebuilding the hotel, or what that sum in erecting a club house. Mr. Peavey and some of the other gentlemen will lay the plans of the club before Mr. Hill when more progress has been made with subscriptions.

FREY FOUND GUILTY.

Jury Only a Minute in Reaching a Verdict—Seven-Year Limit.

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 16.—The jury in the case of the state against George W. Frey took but one minute in making up its verdict and found him guilty. Frey was indicted for an alleged attempt to kidnap a 14-year-old girl named Ida Bond. Sentence will be imposed Monday morning, and Frey will be confined in the state prison for seven years.

One of the most interesting points about the case was the fact that the defendant, who defended Frey, stands indicted for committing a felony, because he performed a contract for an alleged kidnapping. It is charged that he urged it, thinking that the law would not allow a wife to testify against her husband. The matter was taken up next Monday before Judge Lancaster.
