

TREATY IS TO GO IN

RESIDENT HAS DECIDED TO SUBMIT IT AT THIS SESSION OF CONGRESS

SENATE WILL SEE IT FIRST

After the Text of the Document Has Been Formally Laid Before the Upper House It Will Not Be Given to the Public—Indian Bill is Passed by the House.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—The president will submit the peace treaty to the senate during the present session; but much has been definitely determined upon. The text is still lacking here. As the commissioners have not brought proper to entrust the document to the mails, it will not reach Washington before next Saturday. Although a decision of placing it before the senate at the earliest opportunity, the president will not be able to do so for a week after its receipt, for congress will be in holiday recess.

INDIAN BILL PASSED.

I have heard from his own lips the earnest desire of his heart that something practical should be done, and that quickly, to divert to the services of humanity some of the many millions now devoted to preparations for war. He has taken the initiative in summoning the conference. He is preparing to give earnestness of his sincerity by arresting the future increase of Russian armaments. But, unless he is supported by the people, who detest militarism, as well as by those who groan under its burdens, his well-meant endeavor will fail."

SPANIARDS EVACUATING A SUBURB OF HAVANA CAUSE SERIOUS TROUBLE

NUMBER OF SHOTS FIRED

HAVANA, Dec. 17.—A riot occurred at Cerero, a suburb of Havana, at 7:30 tonight. A number of shots were fired. One man is reported to have been killed and five wounded. The residents of Cerero, supposing that the Spaniards had official sanction, the suburbs, raised Cuban and American flags over a number of buildings. Crackers were thrown and speeches were made on street corners, and the rioting on the part of the Cubans led to the rioting on the account of the affair, given by the Spaniards, the riot was the result of tavern brawl.

NEW YORK CANAL FRAUD.
