

DOCKERY AGAIN FREE

THE LEADER OF THE GANG OF BURGLARS MAKES HIS ESCAPE SHOT AT BY THE OFFICER

On His Way From the Reformatory to Minneapolis as a Witness in a Criminal Case—No Trace of the Fugitive—Break for a Liberty Made When Least Expected—News of Minneapolis.

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 16.—The notorious "Billy" Dockery is at large. He escaped from a deputy warden of the reformatory this afternoon while on the way to this city, and made good his escape. Dockery was taken to a witness in a case in the district court and Deputy Warden Norton was detailed to bring him here. The two came down on the Northern Pacific train and at First street and Mrs. Thiel's north Dockery suggested they get off the train there and save time. The deputy was willing and the two stepped out on the platform. Dockery was not handcuffed and as soon as he reached the platform he took to his heels.

The deputy drew his gun and fired at the fugitive. The first shot was wild and another was fired. Dockery fell and cried: "You've shot me."

The deputy made a flying leap, but missed his footing and fell. Dockery, seeing the deputy on the ground, arose and ran down the tracks and soon was lost sight of among the cars. Citizens assisting the deputy in searching for the fugitive, but Jan and succeeded in covering his tracks and Deputy Norton gave up the hunt and reported the escape to police headquarters.

Norton believes he hit Dockery although he would not admit it. He is very serious. The deputy sprained his back badly.

Dockery was sent up to the reformatory a short time ago after being convicted of burglary. His brother, Tom, is wanted by the police, but thus far he has eluded arrest.
