ATTORNEY GENERAL DOUGLAS SAYS THEY MAY BE MODIFIED FOR MINNESOTA.

REPORT MADE TO THE SENATE It is That While the Australian Plan as a Whole Might Conflict With the Constitution, Some of Its Advantages Might Be Made Use of in a Valid Law—Recommends Care in Drafting Bill.

Attorney General Douglas declares against the constitutionality of the Torrens system of land titles in a communication which he sent to the senate yesterday, and which was ordered printed in the journal.

A modified system embodying most of the salient features of the so-called Torrens land title system may be adopted in this state and engrained into its jurisprudence, in a form which would not conflict with the constitution of this state or of the United States.

The system has operated very satisfactorily in Australia, Canada, and resulted in simplifying not only transfer of property, but also the forms of conveyances of the necessary tools for marshaling evidences of title to real estate.

So far as I am advised, three states only, to wit, Illinois, Ohio and New Jersey, have adopted this system of registering land titles, each of them with some special modifications.

The second enactment in Illinois has recently been held to be constitutional by the supreme court of that state.

The first bill which was drafted to authorize the taking of private property by the state for private use without compensation.

Because the acts did not provide for personal service upon all interested parties who were within the jurisdiction of the court.

Because the state has no power to accumulate and use the indemnity funds provided by the act.

Because the act is in violation of the constitution of this state inasmuch as it enacts a limitation upon the power of the state to take private property.

MUNICIPAL JUDGES PREPARE A STATEMENT ON THE PROPOSED ABOLITION.
