

**DR. JORDAN'S CURE?**  
**SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS SAID TO HAVE GIVEN CITY TEACHERS WARNING TOO MUCH CRUELTY FOUND**

Notice Given That the Trainers of the Young Men Will Not Longer Be Given the Benefit of the Doubt When Complaints Are Made That the Children Are Maltreated.

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 5.—Are a number of the public school teachers of Minneapolis addicted to cruelty to their pupils and unfit persons to have charge of young children?

A secret meeting of all the public school teachers of this city, called by Supt. Johnson, and held at the Central high school Saturday morning, would indicate that the answer may be the harbinger of an investigation by the board of education.

Last week all the teachers were notified that they were expected to be present at a special teachers' meeting at the Central high school Saturday morning. The meeting was called by Supt. Johnson, and as this was an unusual thing the teachers gathered in knots and wondered what was going to happen.

When they arrived at the high school on the morning named and saw the doors barred after they were inside and guards placed to insure secrecy, the wonderment grew, but the superintendent did not allow them to remain in the dark much longer.

As soon as he arrived the meeting was called to order, and it is said he proceeded directly to the point by saying that the meeting was called regarding numerous complaints made by parents regarding the treatment their children were receiving at the hands of their teachers.

Without any more introduction than this, it is said that the superintendent proceeded to give his listeners what he termed an artistic dressing down, and among other things he credited with saying that while heretofore he had stood by the teachers when complaints were made by parents, in the future he would stand on the side of the parents, and that from now on their stories would be believed.

He is reported as saying that he has received many complaints of teachers so far forgetting themselves as to do the little ones under their foos and dances, and that one case had been had actually in the hands of a teacher had actually in the hands of a mother who had called to see about the treatment of her child.

He declared that his remarks were being addressed to the older teachers, and that he had their names on a list, and if ever any of them were discharged from their position here he would give the names of the teachers to be taught in any other place, and he advised them that if they were in doubt as to whether their names were on the list, they could find out for certain by calling at his office.

It is said that Supt. Jordan's address produced a wonderful effect upon his listeners, and that many of the old teachers squinted their seats while their superintendent delivered himself of this direct talk.

This is not the first time that rumors have been heard regarding the treatment of scholars in the hands of the general of the schools were overworked. It was found necessary to divide the teachers in two sections, one attending in the morning and the other in the afternoon, and at this time a certain teacher is reported to have made the decision by at the same time saying that she would resign if she was not to have the dunces attend in the morning and the others in the afternoon, and it is said that certain parents took exception to the remark at that time, and very nearly caused the removal of the teacher.

Another story, dating about the same time, told of one teacher, who not only called a pupil a dunc, but threw him against a seat with such violence that his scalp was badly cut.
