

STOLEN CHECKS OUT

A BIG BUNDLE OF THEM IN THE HANDS OF FOUR IN THE GERS. WARNING TO MERCHANTS. Matter Made Public on the Advice of Chief Doyle—Inhuman Cruelty Charged in a Petition for Divorce—Big Business Deal Closed—Peavey Company Wins—The News of the Mill City.

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 23.—Merchants who cash checks are in line just at present to lose money. Last July a bundle of blank checks was stolen from one of the lithographing establishments in this city. During the summer a few of the checks were filled out by the party or parties who stole them, were cashed at stores and refused at the banks. Last week another was cashed and refused. Yesterday one came to the First National bank through its correspondent in St. Paul.

Superintendent of Police Doyle was then advised that the matter be made public. Heretofore it has been kept a secret by the detectives who have been trying to locate the thieves and followers. INHUMANITY CHARGED. Finnish Cruelty Set Forth in a Petition for Divorce.
