NEW G. A. R. OFFICERS STATE ENCAMPMENT CONCLUDES ITS WORK AND ADJOURNS FOR A YEAR MEETS IN MINNEAPOLIS NEXT

D. B. Searle, St. Cloud, Chosen Department Commander—Past Commander E. B. Wood Presented with a Diamond Badge—The Legislature Asked to Continue the Appropriation for the Home.

The Department of Minnesota, G. A. R., completed its tasks yesterday afternoon, and the 425 delegates have nearly all returned to their respective homes.

The first business transacted at the opening session in the morning was the report of the committee on resolutions to re-enact the law appropriating \$20,000 annually for the support and maintenance of the G. A. R. for the work they had done, especially in adding the volunteer soldiers in the recent war.

The ladies of the G. A. R. held a reception from 4 to 6, yesterday afternoon, at Odd Fellows' hall, for the members of the G. A. R. and their wives.

The Women's Relief corps opened their session at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning at the headquarters of the corps, Mrs. Margaret Biggerstaff, St. Cloud.

After the reports were read the body proceeded to the election of officers. Four candidates were nominated for the office of department president.
