HIS FUNDS VERY LOW.

Bank Examiner Pope, may have to lay off some office help unless some relief comes.

Next Year's Appropriation is Not Due Until July 1 and Gen. Pope Will Not Anticipate It—Several State Boards in the Habit of Overdrawing Their Accounts, Which Custom is Depreciated.

Before Moses Dibble Kenyon retired as bank examiner he made a pretty good job of it, cleaning up the contingent fund of the office. There are but a few dollars now to the credit of that fund, and unless the legislature makes some appropriation to meet the deficiency, the only course open to the present bank examiner will be to discharge all of his office force and one examiner whose salary is paid out of this fund.

"I shall have to close up shop," said Gen. Pope yesterday, "unless the legislature makes an appropriation to meet the deficiency, which was very apparent when I took over the office. At that time there was a few hundred dollars on hand, and at present we have just \$300 to last us until July 1, when the appropriation for the next fiscal year becomes available."

"Of course, my salary goes on just the same, and that of the examiners, but the exception of that, I have no other relief is not given us, we will be unable to cover any more territory than the Twin Cities. Just at present there is a case of misappropriation of county funds being investigated in Northern Minnesota and this office has been asked to send a man up to represent the state in going over the accounts of the treasurer."

This was an unpalatable prospect, but the contingent fund are paid not only the salaries of three clerks, one deputy examiner, but all traveling expenses of the other examiners. This state of affairs will seriously handicap the usefulness of the department. I have just enabled me to lay my hand on every document which comes into the department, and otherwise have planned the work for the examiners so as to meet the full requirements of the law in the matter of the state's accounts.

"I am hoping that the legislature will come to our relief and enable us to protect the people of the state fully in their investments, and if it does not, I shall be very much surprised. The salary of one inspector is \$150 per month, one clerk receives \$100, another \$50 and another \$40. It can be seen that after this month we will have nothing to pay these salaries, and I shall have to let them go."

With a capital stock of \$50,000. The new concern will do a general grain commission business, and will be located at the K. Sidle, E. A. Simmons and J. C. Young. The Hallock Building and Loan association was reorganized by a score of Hallock business men.

Winnebago City will have a new manufacturing plant. The Winnebago Manufacturing company will commence operations soon with a capital stock of \$100,000. The plant will manufacture electrical machinery. Articles were filed yesterday with the secretary of state by the incorporators, who are as follows: H. C. Lewis, F. L. Durgan, Geo. W. Sturt and E. J. McGuligan.

Probate Judge Bazille learns that some of the claims allowed were not passed upon in his court, although the estate is still in probate—Mr. and Mrs. Kittson out of the City.

The matter of the guardianship of Alfred S. Kittson, incompetent, came up before Judge Bazille yesterday in probate court on an order to show cause why William H. McDonald should not be permitted to file a claim against the estate for \$3,858.48, although the statutory time for filing has passed. The court took the matter under consideration, and from remarks made during the hearing gave the inference that the matter of the compromise with the creditors at 80 per cent, made by order of the district court, is likely to be reopened.

Under the order of the district court the St. Paul Trust company, as trustee, was required to pay over to Violet H. Kittson, as guardian of A. S. Kittson, \$4,500.33, and yesterday she filed an application to have the amount of her bond, which had previously been \$500, fixed by the probate court. The application was for leave to file a bond of \$25,000. The application was taken under consideration in view of questions that may possibly arise, and the amount may be fixed at a much higher figure in case the St. Paul Trust company is called upon for an accounting of the \$25,000 of money belonging to the estate of Alfred S. Kittson that it has distributed among the creditors under the district court.

The hearing on the claim of W. H. McDonald brought out a large force of attorneys. Samuel A. Anderson and Howland Butler appeared for the petitioner, and John H. Ives for the benefit of Violet S. Kittson, as guardian of Alfred S. Kittson. The claim, which aggregates \$3,858.48, according to Mr. McDonald, came to him from William P. Bickel, and is for money advanced to A. S. Kittson between Feb. 1, 1885, and Jan. 16, 1887. The claimant alleges "that he never had notice or knowledge of the issuance of an order for the appointment of a trustee between Feb. 1, 1885, and Jan. 16, 1887, and that the time within which the creditors of A. S. Kittson might file their claims in the probate court, until on March 7, 1889."

The fact that Violet S. Kittson and Alfred Kittson have gone to Chippewa Falls, where they were called by an accident to Mrs. Kittson's brother, Attorney John H. Ives, submitted to the court a personal affidavit in which he recites "that the affiant never heard of the claim of W. H. McDonald until about a week ago. He believes the claim has no legal value, and that the items are just and proper they are not the property of Mr. Bickel or Mr. McDonald, but rather the property of the receivers of the Minnesota State Bank, which became insolvent during the management of Mr. Bickel."

"That a compromise has recently been made by the creditors of the estate of indebtedness due and that about \$5,000 has already been paid out under the agreement by the St. Paul Trust company. That if this claim is allowed there will be, after paying preferred claims and expenses of administration, sufficient money to pay the claims of those who have long ago filed their claims in the probate court and whose claims are yet unpaid; and creditors will not be able to obtain 80 per cent of their claims, and probably not even 50 per cent. That the claim has been kept in the dark for some purpose unknown to affiant, and the compromise was made on the supposition that no such claim existed."
