

MILLS DEAL CLOSED
MINNEAPOLIS MEN ACQUIRE TITLE
TO THE PROPERTIES THEY
HAVE OPERATED
OUT OF THE TRUST'S REACH

Washburn Mills Under the New
Regime Will Not Be Open to Absorption
by any Flour Combination—
Announcement Officially Confirmed—
New Plan for Extending the
Chamber of Commerce.

Negotiations which have been pending
between the C. C. Washburn Flouring
Mills company, owners of the Washburn
mills, and the Washburn-Crosby com-
pany, operating the plant, have finally
ended in the purchase of the entire prop-
erty, and hereafter the title to this fa-
mous group of mills will belong to the
Minneapolis company. The transactions
necessary to accomplish this have been
carried by William H. Dunwoody, who
went to Philadelphia for the purpose, and
advises today from him show that the
deal has been closed whereby he and his
associates in the Washburn-Crosby com-
pany acquire the controlling interest in
the C. C. Washburn flouring mills.

The capital stock of the company ex-
ceeds \$1,000,000, and it is understood a
premium over this sum was paid for the
mills.

Mr. Dunwoody, who has invested a very
large sum in Minneapolis milling prop-
erty, has been identified with the flour-
making industry here since its earlier
days, when rollers, rollers and millers,
and the now obsolete millstone did the grind-
ing. When the late C. C. Washburn laid
the foundations of the enormous busi-
ness still known by his name, Mr. Dun-
woody was his secretary and confidant.

This purchase it is said will prevent
the absorption of this plant into a trust
of any kind, either now or in the fu-
ture.

J. S. Bell, manager of the Washburn-
Crosby company, when asked for con-
firmation of the purchase of the mills by
Minneapolis capital, said that the deal has
been consummated, and Mr. Dunwoody
has become a large holder of the stock.
Until his return this week, I do not care
to discuss further the details of pur-
chase. It is sufficient now to say that
the purchase is very important in its
bearing on Minneapolis interests.

NEW BUILDING PLAN.

Another One Has Been Sprung on
the Chamber of Commerce.
Those interested in keeping the Minne-
apolis chamber of commerce in its present
location have made a new proposition to
the directors. Instead of the annex it
is proposed to build a building on the
Third street front 105 feet. The ground
floor and the first floor are planned for
offices, with the trading room on the
second floor. The second floor is to be
present trading room, with the elevator
and the entrance from the third floor of the
old building to the trading room, this
square feet, and containing 8,490
square feet, as against 4,150 in the present
room. There would be ten private work-
ing offices on the trading floor. The plan
proposed, also gives a total of forty-nine
additional offices.

GULF LINE LITIGATION.

Judge Phillips Grants Motion to Re-
move Case From the Circuit Court.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 7.—United
States Judge John F. Phillips arose from
a sick bed this afternoon, and collect-
ing the case of the state labor commis-
sioner, 225 Twenty-fifth avenue south,
and granted an order removing the Kansas City, Pittsburg
& Gulf receivership case from the circuit
court to the state court at St. Paul, Minn.

RATES TO EUROPE.

Beaver Steamship Line Has Issued
a New Schedule of Rates.
The Beaver Steamship line has issued a
new schedule of rates to and from Euro-
pe, as follows: Steerage, \$22.50; second
cabin, \$32.50; first cabin, \$45. These rates
are from Montreal to London. The average
rate is apparently \$5 lower than any
rate that has yet been quoted. The com-
pany has also issued a circular stating
that two new passenger boats, 10,000 tons
each, will soon be put in the service of
the line.
