LABOR'S FIELD

More than 150 members of the local carpenters' union attended the weekly meeting of the union at Assembly hall last night. A feature of the meeting was the initiating of a class of twenty-eight members to the union, the names of the new members being as follows: F. Schibale, John B. J. B. Morrison, business agent of the union, reported that a class of forty was ready for initiation at the next meeting. The class initiated last night was said to be one of the largest in the twenty-three years' history of the union. Five new applications were presented at last night's meeting and referred to the executive committee. It was reported during the meeting that out of the fifty-five local contractors fifty-one had accepted the nine-hour ten-cent, the other four working ten hours.

A committee of three, made up of A. J. Metzger, B. Albachten and J. C. Swanson, appointed at the last meeting, draw up suitable resolutions on the death of Peter Rossbach, made its report, which was adopted and the committee discharged. A copy of the resolution was ordered engrossed and sent to the widow of the deceased and the charter was ordered draped for thirty days.

The receipts of the meeting were \$52.50 and the expenses allowed \$15.

Strikers Return to Work. All the boilermakers and helpers, twenty-seven in all, in the employ of the Chicago Great Western road, who went out on strike on Wednesday, returned to work yesterday morning and all was going along smooth at the shops of the company yesterday afternoon when a Globe reporter visited the scenes of the recent trouble at South Park. General Foreman J. M. Robb said:

WILL TRY A NEW PLAN

JOINT COUNCIL COMMITTEE STOPS ITS WORK ON THE MARKET SITE

LAW THAT HAS BEEN PASSED

Gives the Council the Power of Condemning Such Property as It May Select, and This Can Be Seized Without Having to Pay Fancy Prices—Recommends a New Beginning.

After two months of agitation, endless committee meetings, hearings and rehearsals by the board of aldermen and assembly, and the fomenting of no little ill-feeling, the laborers toward a market site have come to naught, and another beginning will have to be made.

The special joint committee composed of the mayor, comptroller, city attorney, Assemblymen Benson and Thompson and Ald. Knaut and Bantz, closed its labors yesterday afternoon and adjourned sine die, with the report to the council that, in view of the new law, passed by both houses of the legislature, providing for condemnation proceedings to acquire a market site, the committee recommended the council take advantage of it, and proceed accordingly, and respectfully requested to be discharged.

On the assembling of the committee yesterday, with all members present, Assistant Corporation Attorney Taylor reported that he had examined all the abstracts presented to him on the property included in the Eagle street site, and several were not yet furnished; that some of the property was mortgaged, and title to other property would require a considerable length of time to straighten out. Inasmuch as the legislature had passed the bill authorizing the city to acquire a site by condemnation proceedings, and the governor has promised to sign it, he was of the opinion that the council should abandon the present plan and proceed by condemnation. The report was adopted and a report to the council framed accordingly.


