PASSING OF ALL SPORTS TO MAKE ROOM FOR THE GAME THAT IS NATIONAL

'WHAT IS THE SCORE TODAY?' Of the 135 players in the Western league fifty-five of them have seen service in the National league. The entire fifty-five are not old National league men, but about half that number have seen duty in the big organization for some years.

'The King is dead—long live the King.' And base ball, which has slumbered the winter months away, is again the only sport that wins the multitude. Fitzsimmons and Jeffries may train and train, and the sport-loving public will turn to them at times and listen to the story of their progress; but they are relegated to second place in public interest now. Base ball is due. The St. Pauls are first in St. Paul.

'While at least six teams have a chance for the pennant, I can see only three teams, four at the most, who have a growing chance for the honors this season. Brooklyn and St. Louis will have entirely new teams, transplanted from Baltimore and Cleveland, where the crowds were growing cold and failed to give the proper encouragement. With larger crowds enthusing the great teams under Hanlon and Tebeau, Boston must work hard from the start to keep its place.

'You can say for me,' said Edward Hanlon, the manager of the reorganized Brooklyn, the other day, 'that the public will see in the Brooklyn this season the greatest ball team ever yet got together. I never saw men in such high spirits. They are like children let out of school. Daly is good on second, and I shall retain either Magoon or Cassidy as an understudy for Jennings at short. Jennings is in perfect trim, and Dahien is going to play third perfectly.'
