SEVERAL OF HIS HITHERTO UNTOLD ESCAPADES IN CHICAGO

THE RESCUE OF DE WITT

Joe Utman Parts With \$300 on a Bogus Order by Wire—Whiteman Assumes the Role of Track Official and Collects Drawn in Fees From Bookmakers—Whiteman's Remarkable Luck in California.

The Chicago Inter Ocean has the following interesting story regarding Alonzo J. Whiteman, who a few years ago was regarded as one of Minnesota's "coming" young men:

Alonzo J. Whiteman, who is called by detectives the "prince of swindlers," ought to be serving the first week of a recently imposed imprisonment for felony committed in Chicago. Whiteman, however, preferred a sea voyage to sojourn in an Illinois prison, and, forfeiting his bail bond just before his sentence was to be affirmed, left for Europe or some other land beyond the seas.

Alonzo J. Whiteman, college graduate, ex-Minnesota state senator, ex-chairman of the Minnesota state Democratic committee, ex-delegate to the Democratic national convention and ex-candidate for member of congress, is a man whose record stands unique. The story of Whiteman's doings in other parts of the country has been told time and again. His Chicago doings—some of them—have never been told to the light. When Whiteman was a student at Hamilton college, New York, he was known as the best poker player in the place. While still a freshman he dropped into the gambling rooms of Dave Dischler, in Utica, N. Y., and broke the bank. Whiteman lost a large amount of money in Minnesota.

Whiteman's doings in Chicago, on the board of the Chicago Inter Ocean, began immediately after the loss of his fortune, which was supposed to be about \$1,000,000. The Chicago wheat and lumber market turned against him, and then he began to slide rapidly down the moral plank. In the year 1890 Whiteman became a bookmaker on the race track, and he failed in this business. He "welshed" on several other bookmakers, and perpetrated a number of swindles by means of "phony" tickets. In 1892 no less a person than Joe Utman, a bookmaker noted for his shrewdness, was swindled by means of a forged telegram, purporting to be from the Chicago Inter Ocean, over the money instant. "Billy" Pinkerton met Whiteman some time after and accused him of swindling Utman. Whiteman denied the charge, and Pinkerton, laughing, told him how he had obtained the proof of the bogus telegram. Whiteman, after it had been presented, while Utman's back was turned.

GAME AT WASHINGTON PARK. Whiteman came back to Chicago about a year after he had so cleverly secured his partner's release. On June 23 of that year, 1894, Whiteman went to the Washington park race track, and with a perfect knowledge of all of business began the collection of the \$300 license fee from business at the track. Whiteman had the regulation money bag over his shoulder and had succeeded in collecting \$200 each from three of the ordinary shrewd bookmakers. The fourth man was suspicious and refused payment. Whiteman did not care to meet Pinkerton, and, fearing immediate arrest, he threw the bag containing the \$200 collected into the track. Whiteman, saying: "Tell McBride I only collected from three of the bookmakers," Whiteman then cleared out. McBride, when he came around, found the bag with the \$200 intact.

Less than a month after this attempt to swindle the bookmakers, Whiteman turned up in Detroit with James De Witt. There they were both arrested on the charge of passing a bogus check on the proprietor of the Cadillac house. Whiteman escaped. Detailed information as to the evidence, but De Witt received a sentence in state's prison.
