BOXXELL MURDER CASE

REV. RODRICK MURRAY, A STAR WITNESS, TESTIFIES FOR THE STATE

TALKED WITH THE ACCUSED

The Defense Made an Effort to Prevent the Introduction of His Testimony, but the Court Ruled for the Prosecution—Substance of the Minister's Story—Had Quizzed Joe Boxell Closely.

BUFFALO, Minn., July 5.—Rev. Rodrick Murray, pastor of the Methodist church at Anandale, was the star witness for the prosecution in the Boxell murder case today. He was formerly engaged in the ministry at Howard Lake, where he formed the acquaintance of the Boxells, and met them frequently. The defense tried to prevent the admission of his testimony, but the court ruled against it. In the latter part of his testimony the witness was asked by the state to tell him all the details of the affair, and Joe had said in reply: "I wish I could." In the same conversation, however, he endeavored to convey the impression that Alex McVeety was the guilty person.

Rev. Mr. Murray testified to a conversation with Joe at the Methodist conference at Smith Lake last fall. They were sitting on the platform near the pulpit. He talked with Joe about his father's death. He asked if Joe had any suspicion as to who was the murderer. Joe said he had. He believed that George Taylor and John Boxell were the murderers of his father. Witness further testified that he saw Joe after that riding in the same rig with Taylor on his way to Buffalo. He saw Joe again after his arrest. He had a talk with him at the constable's house, and told Joe that there was an eye that beheld him and knew all he did that night from the time he left his home to the time that he went across the field to his father's house and back to his home; that the eye had not been become greatly excited, and said he guessed that was the person his wife saw coming out of the woods and watched him going to the depot. He said that he remembered saying that George Taylor and John Boxell were the murderers of his father, and he said yes. Continuing, the witness said that he had not seen him on my way to Rob Mealey's, while he (Joe) was riding with George Taylor. I told him that the day before this I had told George Taylor that Joe said that George was the murderer of his father. I then asked him what George Taylor said to him concerning it. Joe said "Nothing," I said, "Did not George Taylor say anything to you about his being the murderer of your father?" He said, "No, he said not a word." I told him I thought it was very strange that he would ride side by side with a man that he had accused of murdering his father. I asked why he had told me that he believed Taylor and Boxell were the murderers. Joe said because of the way they acted before the murder. I asked how they acted. Joe replied that George Taylor said that he wished the old man could be put out of the way because it was too bad that the money he boys had worked so hard for was being used in such a way.

Ex-Sheriff J. E. Egan, of Hennepin, was recalled and testified to seeing scratches upon the hands of the defendant several days after the murder. The scratches were the same as those seen on the hands of Mark Woolley who was on the stand for the prosecution a part of this afternoon.

NEW CATHOLIC SCHOOL.

Corner Stone for a Structure Laid at Springfield.

SPRINGFIELD, Minn., July 5.—The cornerstone of the new Catholic parochial school was laid here yesterday, at 10 o'clock, with impressive ceremonies. About 100 people were in attendance. Father Haas, of St. Paul, laid the cornerstone, and addresses were delivered in both German and English. After this ceremony, a general Fourth of July celebration and picnic was held near the new school site. The exercises were held at the residence of the pastor, and the Congregational churches held a picnic and celebration at the Bentley place, three miles from town. Various amusements were provided for the entertainment of those in attendance.

ST. CLOUD.

The Number of Fourth of July Casualties Plentiful.

ST. CLOUD, Minn., July 5.—(Special.)—The celebration of the Fourth of July under the auspices of the Firemen's Relief association, proved to be a decided success, and everything passed off smoothly. The day was closed with a splendid display of fireworks. There were a number of casualties, the most serious of which were suffered by Charles Nelson, who had his leg shattered by a giant firecracker, and the little son of J. P. Laverman had a serious injury from the same cause to his left eye. The prisoners held in the city were given a banquet, and yard liberty in the afternoon. Rev. Dr. J. McDewar, of Minneapolis, delivered a patriotic address to them. The exercises were closed by the band.

LAKE DISASTER.

Steamer Saucy Kate Runs Down the Hebe.

The steamer Saucy Kate, while steaming away from the docks at Lake Park, Minnetonka, at 11 o'clock Tuesday evening, struck the Hebe amidships, making a big hole in her side and sinking her. The engine of the Hebe was unable to get the boat to the dock and unload the passengers before the boat went down.

NO BOAT FOR BRICE.

He Failed to Secure a Naphtha Launch for a Dollar.

Judge Brooks denied the motion of Alfred L. Brice for a new trial of the suit against Lewis S. Gillette for the possession of a large naphtha launch at Minnetonka. Mr. Brice claims that he bought the vessel at a sheriff's sale at the court house here. The boat was not within view, however, at the time of the sale, and the court held that this fact invalidated Mr. Brice's claim.
